#### Latest News of the City and Province.

At 1.45 o'clock this morning a fire broke out in Mr. D. Stewart's bakery. Owing to prompt discovery the blaze caused but little damage to the roof. The fire originated near the oven. The firemen were very prompt.

Geo. Carter & Co. report a rushing trade yesterday in Bulbs. The quality of this year's stock is better than usual, and prices very moderate.
