

C. N. R. MAIN LINE BLOCKED FOR TRAFFIC EIGHT HOURS

MONCTON, Aug. 16—An accident in which two Canadian National Railway freight trains were involved was responsible for blocking the intercolonial main line for several hours yesterday at Val Brilliant, Que., 70 miles north of Campbellton. Some seven cars in all were derailed but the damage to the roadbed and equipment was not great and no persons were injured. The wrecking auxiliary from Campbellton was quickly dispatched to the scene and had the line clear for traffic within eight hours after the mishap. The cause of the accident has not been determined. All eastbound C.N.R. trains from the Upper Province to the Maritimes

were held up as a result of the accident, the Maritime Express being the longest delayed, not reaching this city until after six o'clock, or eight hours behind schedule. The crack Acadia train only sustained a hold up of 1-2 hours and arrived here at 4:30 leaving immediately afterward for Halifax. The Ocean Limited due here at 4:15 was only 1-2 hours late in reaching Moncton, being delayed least of any. Freight traffic was also tied up to a considerable extent as a result of the derailment.

By "Big Jim" It is reassuring to note that the directors of our big Provincial Fair are keeping step and even leading in the march of progress along those lines. Many of us might think that Exhibitions, which we read about are better than our own, but when we hear the hearty and unsought praise of foreign visitors for the excellence of our Provincial Fair, is caused a sense of guilt on our part, in not properly appreciating the excellence of, and properly boasting our own Exhibition and our own home town. The "boast and be cheerful" spirit helped to build the western cities and towns—it might be a "panacea for the ills of the East."

All the Island will be "on parade" at Charlottetown this week, and it's up to us to appeal ourselves as well as we can, and be pleasing and courteous and obliging to our tourist friends, when opportunity offers—to set the "major domino" (master of the house), or words to that effect, talk to them—make them feel at home. The great majority of them will be glad to converse with native born Islanders. No need of an "inferior complex"—our people are qualified to talk to anybody. They are endowed with native grace and humanity—which is "carte blanche" to approach kings and queens.

If the weather holds good for this week, we will see the biggest and best Exhibition ever taking place on P. E. Stampede At Summerside

The Twin Circle Stampede puts on its last performance today (Saturday) and will then proceed to Halifax and other points in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, going on to Quebec and Montreal where they will receive a fresh shipment of forty of the best bucking horses for the big show they are putting on in Montreal. The Stampede has been in Summerside since Tuesday putting on shows daily at which there has been a steady attendance. Wednesday was their best day when about five thousand people from different parts of the Island enjoyed the performance. It was estimated that over twenty thousand people witnessed the stampede during the week.

During Thursday's performance, Broncho Bill, the cow-boy, broke one of his wrists and severely sprained the other one. Dr. Jenkins, of Charlottetown, who was present, attended to his injuries. Later on in the afternoon, the young man fell in the wild horse race and was badly cut up when a horse reared and struck him, knocking him of his mound. He will not be able to ride again for some time.

The performances were considered by people who had witnessed others of the kind in the west to be of a very superior order. Frongua Kid gave a fine exhibition of bucking horse riding on Kid Weir. A half mile dash was won by "Kangaroo Kid" owned by Mr. B. H. Ramsay, of Alberta. Some good horse racing by horses from Hulton, Maine, was put on, the winner of the one mile dash making the good time of 2:14 1/2. The chuck wagon race was a very novel affair to the people on the Island and was much enjoyed. The steer riding was a fine exhibition of cow-boy skill. Rope spinning and trick riding were equally enjoyed. Shorty La Fontaine, who has some wonderful trained ponies, had a "boxing bout" with the renowned Joe O'Brien of Charlottetown, in which O'Brien came off victorious. The wild cow milking contest caused a great laugh.

During the week these gentlemen addressed a number of meetings in the western part of Prince County. The ladies at Glenwood put up a splendid picnic after the demonstration, in aid of the school fair which will take place in the near future. Five school districts were represented.
