In its worst form, and so we must deal with it.

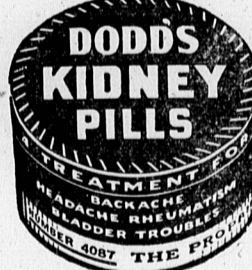
It is time for temperance leaders to get together and formulate the best advisable plan to defeat the liquor onslaught. If a policy can be framed, which will not interfere with party interests, as I think it can, and yet place the matter of prohibition and all temperance issues under a governing power that cannot be tampered with or broken, a policy allowing voters to vote for whatever fiscal or economic policy they prefer, with temperance and the protection of our youth from the ravages of booze, it should result in a return to Prohibition, temperance and sobriety.

SILENCE A VIRTUE

Sir.—There are times when silence is a virtue. Especially so when a Quixote undertakes to blow Gibraltar off the map with a pop-gun. The Liberal orator of Friday, makes this mistake. It said:—"It will be remembered that before the Bennett Government came to power in 1930 Mr. Bennett promised to make 'the tariff fight for all of the people.' There:—"As a result through exchange, and so-called dumping regulations very high duties were paid. Consumers found the tariff 'fighting' for them, not by getting them lower price but by making them pay greatly increased prices."

It would be soothing to the "low tariff" high taxes if they had any backing to this statement. Unfortunately it is directly opposite to the facts. The King Government are the biggest exploiters of this "dumping duty," ever known in Canada. I give one instance. On a childrens Christmas toy, not made in Canada, imported by our firm, on which the Bennett Government collected duty, sales tax and ex-



cise of \$1.19 total, this marvelous non-taxation-low tariff Liberal revenue grabbers collected \$11.25 on an invoice of only \$2.70. Better for the Patriot to keep silent on "dumping duty." May I add that the Bennett \$1.19 was, and still is the legal duty authorized by parliament, the \$11.26 a departmental creation of the King party.

It then boasts of the Treaty with Japan. What of it? Goods, and especially toys and cheap decorations: are made in Japan, and bought by every nation. Under the "cruelty" of the Bennett "Fighting Tariff" Japanese goods were only required to pay the "dumping duty" on exchange of 50 per cent ad valorem authorized by parliament. Under the King taxer the Minister first jacks up the price some hundreds per cent, then adds on top of this price of his own creation the 50 per cent "special duty."

The Bennett Government made "tariffs fight" for the farmers in raising the price of their products, and "Figh" for consumers in giving the babies their Christmas rattles and toys, not made in Canada, at the cheapest prices. The new Liberal helped the prices of farm products by opening our markets to the States, and increased the price of our home needs by exporting fabulous high duties and taxes on cheaper import.

Bennett fought for the interests of the consumers and producers as against the big interests. The Liberal Government is fighting hard for the benefit of the high jacking monopolists, in shutting out competitive imports, and compelling consumers to pay the exorbitant prices to Canadian combines financed by United States head offices.

I cheerfully invite intelligent study into facts of this type, the proof of which is on record. I am, Sir, etc. LEWIS P. TANTON. Botanical Notes For December

(By E. W. Hart) (Central experimental Farm, Ottawa)

With the last month of the year comes Christmas, and with that festive season—

"That best portion of a good man's life, His little, nameless, unremembered acts Of kindness and of love."

Down through the ages this spirit of Yule-tide has always been identified with the adornment of the home, church, other places of assembly and, comparatively recently, greeting cards.

The ever popular Christmas tree, holly, mistletoe, Christmas greens or Club mosses, with other evergreens and the flaming poinsettia, enter into the present day decorative schemes, perhaps more than any other plants; while the "unremembered acts of kindness and of love" are often beautifully expressed by gifts of roses, carnations and lilies-of-the-valley.

The use of the Christmas tree would seem to be traceable to the last century B.C., when it was not a rule, the larger trees are balsams, and for the smaller, black spruce, sometimes white, and occasionally Norway spruce are used.

The part which holly plays, both ecclesiastical and secular, in Yuletide decoration is also of ancient origin. Most of that used in Canada is said to grow in British Columbia, as unfortunately, that species used and known as English holly, is not hardy in other provinces. There is, however, the winterberry or black alder, a near relation, an exceedingly handsome shrub, with bright scarlet berries and spineless leaves, which grows in other provinces, but not being evergreen, it is not adaptable to Christmas decoration.

Mistletoe, a parasitic plant, has been always under the ban of its old association with heathenism, so that amidst the other plants that decorate the church at this great festival, it finds no place. This association with pagan worship which well may be forgiven it, but even the chaste salute of PAX TECUM, (Peace be with thee) which has since grown up in, perhaps, considered detrimental to the awakening of thoughts altogether adapted to the genius loci, is mistletoe were seen suspended in close proximity to the family pew! Nevertheless, Herrick, full of quaint erudition, finding ever valuable lessons in the commonest and most unlikely things, sees in this ecclesiastically ostracized mistletoe a beautiful emblem of his dependence upon the care of Providence—

"Lord, I am like the mistletoe Which has no root, and cannot grow. Or prosper, save by that same tree It clings about; so I by Thee."
