LOBSTERS.—The close season for lobsters now prevails everywhere in these provinces and with the majority of packers and fishermen this regulation is rigidly observed. Rumor has it that there are some still fishing and packing lobsters along certain parts of the Northumberland Straits. It is said that the price paid to the fishermen is less than current during the legal open season and that the goods when packed have to be sold at less money than could be obtained for them if properly packed at the proper time says The Halifax Herald. The pack of last season proves the best for the past five years, and as the shipment of lobsters in the shell is also larger the catch is considered well over the average. The high prices current at the present time for live lobsters in the United States draws attention to the advisability of having lobsters that are caught in May and June stored in Canadian waters in pounds or cars during the open season so as to be able to ship them when the demand is heavy in the summer and winter. The prices are high. Such facilities with improved means of transportation are greatly needed by our fishermen.
