Tuberculosis in Hogs

Of carcasses and portions of Hogs Condemned in Establishments under Federal Control, over 70% is an account of TUBERCULOSIS.

A study of the figures reveals a condition approaching alarm. First the actual financial loss and second the waste of what would have been good food.

1. The loss in the packing house due to the condemnations owing to Tuberculosis is approximately 10 cents for every hog that is slaughtered.

In one year 2,460,901 hogs were slaughtered, which means a loss of \$246,000 based on the above calculations. This loss is almost entirely unwarranted if pasteurization of dairy by-products were insisted upon together with sanitary handling and surroundings.

2. With 4,844 Carcasses of hogs and 1,208,113 portions condemned in one year, approximately 2,148,826 pounds of pork are destroyed which otherwise would have been safe food.

The above tremendous losses must be borne by the producer and consumer.

TWO PROVINCES WILL NOT GIVE WAY TO OTTAWA

Commenting upon the licensing of extra-provincial insurance companies in Ontario by the Provincial Government, Attorney-General Price this morning said:

"Ontario and Quebec have acted together in this, as we feel that the law is on our side. These New England companies have been doing about fifteen per cent of the insurance business in the province. They were taxed five per cent of their takings by Ottawa, but the province got nothing. We failed last session to get the legislation we wanted at Ottawa but as the law was on our side, we have been licensing and taxing. We have asserted our right, under the law as interpreted by the courts, and so far, nothing has happened."

"I do not know whether Ottawa is continuing to collect its five per cent, or not, but we do not intend to relinquish the position we have taken."

"BABY PUZZLE" IS SOLED BY NURSE

CLEVELAND, Sept. 23.—Officials of the Fairview Park Hospital are convinced that the "baby puzzle" has been solved and the infant girl whose identity has been drawn in dispute is Mrs. Sam Smith's own child.

With the return to the hospital of Miss Ruth Meyer, a nurse who assisted in delivering Mrs. Smith's child in spite of the fact that she recalled distinctly the baby was a girl, but that in the stress of the moment following its birth she became excited and told the family physician, Dr. J. A. Reutenik, it was a boy.

Dr. Reutenik was not present at the birth, arriving ten minutes afterwards.

Although she has been nursing the infant girl, Mrs. Smith refused to leave the hospital until she is convinced she had her own child. She has insisted a boy was born to her because the doctor and nurses told her so.

Miss Meyer accepted full responsibility for misinforming the doctor and other nurses as to the sex of the child, Superintendent Volmer said.

Charles F. McConnell, attorney for Mr. and Mrs. Smith, said today that he will not be fully satisfied with Miss Meyer's account of the error unless the crumpled and alterations of the birth record of the Smith baby are explained.

The record shows that the sex of the baby first was designated as "male," but the letters "fe" were prefixed in a different handwriting.

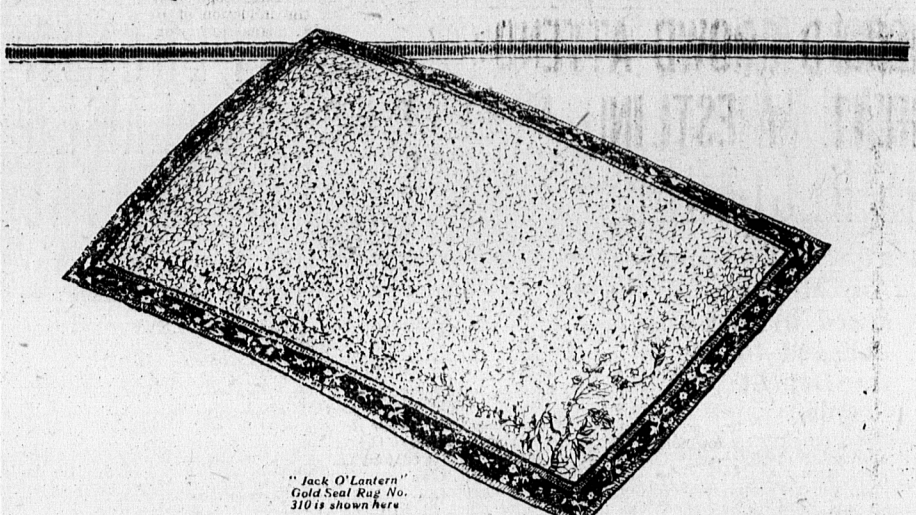
