MONTREAL, March 4.—The action between the Diamond Light Company and R. C. FIFTY THOUSAND FOR BOY SCOUTS SAYS DUKE

OTTAWA, Mar. 4.—The annual meeting of the Dominion Council of the Canadian Boy Scouts was held in the Senate Railway Committee Room in the Parliament Buildings last Friday afternoon. The meeting was honored by the presence of His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, Chief Scout; Sir MacKenzie Bowell, former Prime Minister, and other Parliamentarians, and was attended also by representative workers in the organization from different parts of Canada.

In the course of his reply to a resolution of thanks for his devoted and influential support of the Boy Scouts movement in Canada, throughout the British Empire, His Royal Highness made a most gratifying announcement. This was to the effect that a personal appeal made by His Royal Highness for the raising of a fund to permit of the appointment of a Dominion secretary had already brought in subscriptions to the amount of \$35,000, exclusive of a sum of \$15,000, which was promised by the late Lord Strathcona as a

contribution towards the same object. His Royal Highness, in commenting on this very practical proof of the existence of widespread sympathy for the movement, observed that the response to his appeal was eminently satisfactory, or rather formed a very promising commencement. "For," he added, "I hope to receive at least another \$10,000 before the list is closed." The speaker expressed his best thanks to all those who had responded to his appeal, making special mention of Sir Henry Pellatt, Sir Edmund Osler, Toronto, and Mr. Wm. P. Price, Quebec, who have each subscribed no less than \$3,000.

ELLIS WILL SOON KNOW HIS FATE.

CHICAGO, March 5.—William Cheney Ellis, a wealthy Cincinnati manufacturer, charged with the murder of his wife in a Chicago hotel last October will know his fate before tonight. The closing argument is being made today and the case will then go to the jury.

KILLED BY A BOMB SENT THROUGH MAIL.

DECATUR, Ills., March 4.—"If anything happens to me see John Baucum." This was found on the body of F. W. Menerich, who was killed in his home by a bomb he had received in the mail, who is only 18 years old. The coroner's jury recommended that the youth, who is said to have assaulted Menerich last week after a quarrel, be held to the grand jury pending a further investigation of the tragedy.

United States Postal Inspectors are investigating a charge that a friend of Menerich's wife, from whom he was separated, may be implicated. An effort is also being made to trace the package back to the office from which it was mailed and so identify the sender.
