open plain which was the beginning of No Man's Land. About a mile and a half away a dense thicket fringed the plain. Knowing the Boche's method of hiding anti-tank guns in thickets I became very wary of the whole situation.

The night of June 10 we moved up after dark to an assembly position some two miles from known German positions. We camouflaged ourselves, dug in and managed to grab about an hour's sleep before Orders Group started in the morning.

"At any rate, phase one of the attack was to consist of the Squadron, 1st Hussars, Own Rifle, to proceed from the last held position a mile or two to the town called Norrey en Bessin, to the next town, Souleuvre.

Save The Children Fund

These conditions among children in Europe as reported by troops working of the Save The Children Fund were revealed to the audience of the Funds Canadian Committee.

Fund workers in Europe had been informed by the Yugoslav Central Committee that 317,000 refugees in Serbia from Bosnia had lost everything - 98,000 of these were said to be children.

Just now statutory bodies in Serbia are responsible for 50,000 children. This amount is the chief of the Section for Maternity and Child Welfare in Serbia, received by Mr. McRuer. "These children have lost one or both parents. We have great difficulties to assist them as we have no means of getting them clothes and shoes."

"As far as food is concerned, we can give them very little meat, very little cereals and vegetables. Their food consists mainly of maize-bread, beans and a little potatoes and cabbage. Doctors report various illnesses caused by the lack of vitamins."

The Canadian Committee of the Save The Children Fund is at present financing a team of ten workers on loan to UNRRA in Yugoslavia in order to help ease the situation there wherever possible. Mr. McRuer said hundreds of kits have been sent from Canada to the Netherlands Red Cross for Dutch children and to the fund workers in Sweden for the 75,000 reduce children located there.

Under an "adoption" plan recently drawn up between the Canadian Committee of the Fund and the Sweden branch of the Save The Children International Union, various sponsor may give \$5 per year to feed or clothe a refugee child. The sponsor then receives a picture of his "adopted" child and his case history.

The Fund reports that the Benvolent and Protective Order of Elks in Canada and Newfoundland have been particularly responsible through their contributions of more than \$75,000 for the Canadian Committee's extensive work among child bomb victims in Great Britain.

Financial Report

The following financial statement for the quarter ending April 30, was read by Coun. B. Earle MacDonald, chairman Finance Committee.

The quarter ended April 30th shows a credit balance in Civic account of \$5,381.00, which shows a good collection of taxes both current and arrears for the first quarter.

The expenditures are practically the same as last year. However, expenditure to School Board is higher than for the corresponding period of last year. There is also an item of some \$8,000 transferred to Sinking Fund from current expenditures. It is an amount that was owed Sinking Fund and has now been adjusted, and the addition of this \$8,000 shows a slight increase in expenditures this year as compared with last.

To make a comparison with last year, minus these three items of expenditure (\$15,635.00), the expenditures for the first four months of 1944 were \$103,330.00; for the first four months of 1945 were \$101,762.00. Receipts for 1944 were \$103,480.00; receipts for 1945 were \$112,271.00.

The finance committee invested \$25,000.00 in the 8th Victory Loan. All bank balances in the City Clerk's books are in line with the bank balances shown by the statement of the Royal Bank of Canada.
