"OUR BOYS UNDER FIRE."

Miss Annie E. Mellish's little book of 142 pages with above title has been laid on our table and placed before the public at a most timely and auspicious moment, just as our brave boys are returning from South Africa. It gives in concise and highly interesting form the story of Company G—the New Brunswick and P. E. Island men—from the date of their enlistment to their return. Incidentally the reader is given an outline of the entire war, and especially of the Canadian share in what was achieved.

The story is well told, the clear narrative being enlivened by incidents, adventures and pleasing descriptive matter. Through it all breathes the spirit of love for the Island, for Canada and the Empire. The book is in many ways highly creditable to the fair young authoress, the more especially that it is her first book. We rest assured that it will not be her last. It is neatly printed and adorned with 42 illustrations among which are many portraits of the officers and men of Company G, including the brave young men who gave up their lives for Queen and country. The names of every officer and man of the Canadian force has also been given, and a special list is made of all who were killed, died of disease, or were wounded in the war. This brief and imperfect outline will serve to show that Miss Mellish's book is a timely and valuable memento which all patriotic citizens should desire to possess and preserve.

PROFITS OF MINING.

There was a time when the people of the eastern parts of Canada and the United States considered a mining man on a par with the gambler, and if a merchant or business man invested in mines he endeavored to conceal the fact from his contemporaries, for the reason that if it were generally known it would injure his credit. The citizens of the larger eastern cities are commencing to realize that it is a legitimate industry that yields large profits, and this opinion is being reflected in the leading journals. The following from the New York Tribune shows how the sentiment toward mining is changing:—

"The mining industry has paid more dividends, compared with other industries than any other business known. Compare the profits in mining with the profits of 156,000 odd miles of railroad, with the aggregated liabilities of nearly \$10,000,000,000, then you will see which pays the best. Under the wing of mining there exists some of the safest and most profitable of all business. Take, for instance, the twelve great smelting companies—the mineral pawnbrokers. The smelting com-

panies that do a strictly custom business show absolutely and unquestionably larger profits than any other industry in America. I know of instances where capital invested in smelting companies has been turned five times a year, and each time the margin of profit has been over 20 per cent. of the entire amount handled. They take no risk; simply buy the raw gold and silver in the ore, at a reduced price, extract their cost of treatment and pay the miner a residue. It is a business where the principal is absolutely safe."

JOHN LA FARGE ON TRUTH IN ART.

"When I work as an artist I begin at once by discarding the way in which things are really done, and translating them at once into another material. Therein consist the pleasure that you and I take in the work of art,—perhaps a new creation between us. The pleasure that such and such reality gives me and you have been transposed. The great depth and perspective of the world, its motion, its never-resting, I have arrested and stopped upon a little piece of flat paper. That very fact implies that I consider the flatness of my paper a fair method of translating the non-existence of any flatness in the world that I look at. If I am a sculptor I make for you this soft, moving fluctuating, colored flesh in an immovable, hard, rigid, fixed, colorless material, and it is this transposition which delights you; (in a lesser degree who has made it). Therefore at the very outset of the beginning to affect you by what is called the record of a truth, I am obliged to ask you to accept a number of the greatest impossibilities, evident to the sense, and sometimes disturbing, when the convention supposed to be agreed upon by you and myself is understood only by one of the two parties in the carrying out of the matter.—From the International Monthly for November.
