MR. AULD'S UNJUST CRITICISMS.

Dear Mr. Editor,—Every once in a while an individual arises to proclaim from the housetops, the shortcomings of poor little Prince Edward Island. Such an individual is Joseph Auld, who apparently thinks it his mission to rake us up re these shortcomings, if such they are. Now, Mr. Editor, I presume Mr. Auld came here to enjoy our hospitality, and our beautiful quiet, peace-loving Island, and I hope he received full measure. If he did not, then the blame rests on himself. But why, in the name of all that's queer, does he want to criticise us? If we want prohibition, can't we have it? If we also have a natural desire to legislate on our own safety, and have in force an automobile law, can't we do so, or for that matter if there is anything else that Prince Edward Islanders consider a necessity to their happiness, can't they have all these without being harshly criticised by outsiders, who in most cases are aliens to our land, and live under another than the British flag.

Even although Mr. Auld is a native of the Island, he has no right to rake us up re what he is pleased to consider our shortcomings. First of all he attacks our prohibition, then the hotels run up against his ideas of what should be model hostleries, and last of all our narrow gauge railway, and steam boat services are to receive attention. Well, Mr. Editor, it is just possible our methods of enforcing sobriety, housing our tourists, running our trains, steamboats, etc., may not be that desirable, but that is no reasonable argument in favor of a dweller (even tho' he be a native Islander) under a foreign flag, in forcing upon us through the press his unwelcome, and for the most part, unjust criticism of the manner in which we conduct our public affairs.

In closing this letter, Mr. Editor, I would like to express my hearty endorsement, as one of your readers, at least, the opinions expressed editorially in The Guardian on public matters and especially the Prohibitory Law. Our beautiful little Island is all right, and the tourists who frequent our shores, be they former Islanders or otherwise, would only see its beauties, its many attractions and enjoy the hospitality of its people they would feel much happier on departing from our shores, and carry with them the desire to again revisit us. #### CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION.

A trip to Toronto about the last week in August or the first week in September is bound to be most enjoyable, and all the more so if made during the time of the Canadian National Exhibition, which is the largest annual fair held anywhere on this continent.

The dates of the Exhibition this year are from August 27th until September 12th, and for a period extending over this time the Intercolonial Railway announce a series of special fares that ought to prove attractive to those who are contemplating a trip to the "Queen City." Round trip tickets at first class one way fare, will be issued on August 25th, 27th, 29th, 30th, and 31st, and on Sept. 7th and 8th, good for return September 14th. Fares still more reasonable will prevail on August 26th and September 6th, these tickets being also good for return on September 14th.

Those travelling by the Intercolonial will be enabled to reach Toronto by the shortest and most comfortable route from the Maritime Provinces. The Ocean Limited, which arrives in Montreal at 7.35 a. m., connects at Bonaventure Union Depot with the Grand-Trunk International Limited which leaving Montreal at 9.00 a. m., arrives in Toronto at 4.30 p. m., thus saving hours of time. The Maritime Express, arriving in Montreal at 6.30 p. m., makes connection with the night expresses of the Grand Trunk Railway, arriving in Toronto early the following morning. The opportunity is thus given for a most enjoyable trip at rates that are very reasonable. Traffic is always much increased during this period, and those who have this trip in mind will do well to apply early for sleeping car reservations.
