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Further Proposals Made To Miners

LONDON, April 20—Mine owners late last night completed proposals which are believed may go some way towards a settlement of the coal strike. New proposals are: First, The establishment of a national wages board. Second, application of national principles to wages in each district based upon financial condition of industry in respective districts. Third, periods ascertaining direct results to be settled nationally. Fourth, point below which wages shall be automatically reduced to determine nationally. Fifth, turn over as to wages to workers. In addition to these rates the whole of surplus revenue available in each district

during existing abnormal period, sixth satisfy workers' representatives in each district that district is proposing pay all wages it can. Seventh, confer with workers and representatives with a view to dealing with wages to lower paid men. Eighth, to seek an agreement with workers on a national basis regarding relation between wages and profits for the future. Ninth, providing for joint audit of mine owners books.

from him. It cannot be said that that truth has yet been found and when it is found the chances are that intuition and not logic will have led to it.

Dare I refer to lecture delivered before the Astronomical Society at Toronto, on the Origin of Planets by the late Dr. Percival Lowell, then chief astronomer and director of Birdrock Observatory, Arkansas. In accounting for the "apparent" motion of the planets, he maintained the planets as well as the comets have their origin in the sun as the product of solar disturbances produced by internal eruptions. "In conclusion," he said, "as far as my researches are concerned, the Nebular Theory as an explanation of the origin of Planets is no longer tenable." Is it not a wonder that someone in that large audience did not remind him of the "great authorities."

So much for the teaching of the "great authorities"; I would there fore submit, without comment the statement of these astronomers to the intelligent public believing that they are quite capable of drawing their own conclusions. I believe that P. E. Islanders are like the Athenians—they desire to hear "some new thing" and although they should come to hear what a "Gabbler" has to say they can be relied upon to weigh the evidence. As far as I am personally concerned I will continue, as heretofore, my observations and will leave myself free to make my own deductions, notwithstanding the parrotizing air of this ancient scribe. Not desiring to occupy too much of your valuable space I shall take up the question of the Nebular at a later date. In the meantime leaving the "great authorities" to the care of their dotting champion, I am Sir, etc.
