Pass a Resolution in Reference to

REV. J. A. GORDON'S

Resignation of the Main St. Church, St. John, New Brunswick.

St. John, July 31.—The Baptist ministers met in weekly conference as usual this morning. There were present Rev. Messrs. J. W. Manning, Dr. Gates, E. W. Kelly, A. H. C. Morse, Ira Smith, Dr. Black, B. Nobles and P. J. Stackhouse. Prayer was offered by the Rev. E. W. Kelly. In the absence of the chairman Rev. J. A. Gordon, Rev. J. W. Manning presided. Reports from the churches were received and were of usual satisfactory nature.

The committee appointed at the last session to prepare a minute in reference to the Rev. J. A. Gordon's resignation submitted the following resolution:—  
"Having been informed by our esteemed brother in the ministry—Rev. A. J. Gordon—that he has severed his pastoral connection with the Main street church of this city in order to accept a

call to the first Baptist church of Montreal and that he will shortly remove thither we feel that it is but fitting that there should be recorded in the minutes of this conference and also conveyed to our brother Gordon an expression of our hearty love and esteem for him as a brother in the Lord and a Christian minister, and our high appreciation of the faithful and valued service which during the term of his ministry in this city and in other parts of the Maritime Provinces he has rendered to the cause of Christ and to our denomination. London, July 31.—The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev. Frederick Temple, D. D. rendered a decision today in the ritual cases, when he and the Archbishop of York, the Most Rev. William Dalrymple MacLagan, D. D., heard in May. The Archbishops declare that while far from saying the use of incense and the carrying of lights in procession are unsuitable or undesirable accompaniments of divine worship, they are obliged, in accordance with the prayer book, to come to the conclusion that these adjuncts are neither enjoined nor permitted by the law of the Church of England. Therefore, the Archbishops add, though they may be used to sweeten a church or for purely lighting purposes, they urge all the clergy, for the sake of the peace of the Church, to discontinue their use as part of the services.
