HOW THE WEEK DAYS GOT THEIR NAMES

Formerly the days of the week were numbered one, two, three, four, five and six, beginning with the Sabbath. Even now the custom still prevails among certain modern Greeks, the Slav and the Finns. Many old fashioned and orthodox Quakers, particularly in the north of England, still hold to this custom, which was the common one in the days of the Apostles and down to the fourth century, as well as usual among the Jews and the Arabs. The orthodox Quakers use the numerical system in preference to the ordinary on the ground that the gods and goddesses, from whom the names were taken, were not of the highest respectability in the eyes of morals.

The week was originally only a convenient quarter of the lunar month. Hence it began on Monday, or moon day. The Italians still call Monday the first and Sunday the seventh day of the week. Tuesday is derived from the Norse Tiw, who corresponded to Mars, the god of war. Thursday was Thor's day, Thor being a god warrior. Wednesday again was Woden's day. Woden being the god of "battering." The Romans called this day Mercury's Friday was supposed to be the luckiest day of the week—for women. It was called after the Norse Frigg, the goddess of Love, and is the best day for weddings. For the pagan Romans it was also the day of Venus, though the Christian Romans called it the day of St. Luke because Christ had been crucified on that day. Saturday was called after Saturn and Sunday was known to the Christians as a respite of Sunday.

The week of seven days was imported from Alexandria into Greece, and into Italy about the time of Christ. The Greeks had previously divided their month into sets of eight days, the Romans into sets of ten days, three and a half sets being equal to one month.

MYSTERY COAL BEDS

Whence did we get our greatest national treasure? No one can say with certainty, says T. B. Bits. The origin of the coal deposits still baffles science. Some men, after years of investigation, say that bitumen flowed out of the earth into lake bottoms and estuaries, and there, in the course of ages, was gradually turned into coal. Others believe it to be of animal origin, like the great rungs and nitrate beds. But a majority of scientists believe that coal resulted from a great accumulation of vegetable matter. At the end of the various kinds of coal fuels we have peat and lignites, and in these the vegetable remains are clearly visible. But at the other end is anthracite, in which no trace of vegetable structure can be seen. In all the various types of coal there is some evidence of vegetable origin, excepting anthracite. But one great problem that cannot be solved is, how did this vast accumulation of vegetable matter take place? It seems incredible that so much could be gathered together to form the thick seams of coal common in England and Wales. The question remains a mystery of nature.

HISTORY IN NAMES

There are some common familiar names which we use on all sorts of occasions, of the real meaning of which we are not very certain. For example, there is that very common little word "jacket," which so many little boys wear. Well, jacket means nothing more or less than a little jack or jacque, and this was originally a leather tunic worn over the armour by a warrior in the Middle Ages. It was the same jack that English soldiers were ordered to put the red St. George's Cross to distinguish them from the French foe, and here we find the origin of the Union Jack. We will briefly examine a few words which in the present time are very much in vogue.

The word "bread" is very much in use just now. Its older forms are bread, bride and the Scottish bried. In connection with "bread" we turn to "loaf." Its original forms are loaf, loaf, (Finnish.) General Shrapnel, the father of munition factories, owes his title to coal, which in ancient dialect, was "char-bonnel." The latter appellation gradually drifted round to "Shrapnel"—hence Shrapnel.

One could write a whole chapter about "walmart." It only means "the foreign nut," the Saxon word wall being the same as "wales" and "Welsh," which merely meant "a strange country. Welsh meant "foreigners" to the Saxons, just as barbarians did to the Russians.

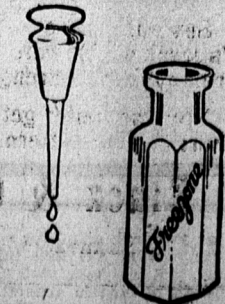

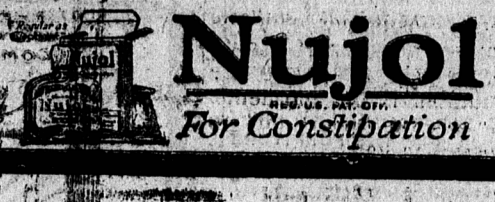
