Chief Scout's Address

Mr. John A. Stiles, Chief Executive Commissioner, Boy Scouts Association of Canada, introduced Lord Baden-Powell.

Lord Baden-Powell expressed his pleasure in being in the local Scouts. He had been many times in Canada but had missed the best part by not having been previously in Prince Edward Island. As Prince Edward Island had led the way in making the Dominion, the Chief hoped she would likewise be the first among the Scouts and Guides in the matter of progress. On the Confederation tablet there was represented a bundle of sticks bound together. The Scouts and Guides likewise should be bound together by loyalty and so have a strength which members could not have individually.

Lord Baden-Powell read a message from H. R. H. Prince of Wales in which the latter expressed his pleasure in hearing of the progress made by the Scouts and Guides in numbers, smartness and efficiency. He urged that they keep strong sense of brotherhood with the Scouts of other countries as well as those of the Dominions, and that they do their best to be loyal and helpful citizens of the Empire.

Award Presented

In calling upon Mr. J. R. Burnett to come forward to receive the Award of Merit, Provincial Commissioner R. C. Parent stated that Mr. Burnett had been a pioneer Scout worker on Prince Edward Island, having organized the Third Charlottetown (Kirk) Troop. He had been chairman of this troop for many years, had been president of the Provincial Council in 1931 and 1932, and was now a member of the Canadian General Council. As editor of The Guardian he had run a column of Scout News for more than a dozen years, to the great benefit of the movement in this province.

Mr. Burnett then received the Award from the hands of the Chief Scout. Three cheers were given for the recipient of this honour.

The Grand Rally closed with the National Anthem and with three cheers for the King, the Chief Scout and Guide, and His Honour Lieutenant Governor DeBolt.

The Canadian Legion Band was present and rendered much appreciated selections.

Lady Baden-Powell, Chief Guide, addressed a large gathering, composed chiefly of ladies, in the Confederation Chamber at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. She opened up to her audience new vistas with regard to Guiding, and was followed with close attention as she portrayed what Guides are doing and have been doing the world over.

In South Africa, there were two dominating white races which frequently quarrelled. Despite this condition Guiding and Scouting went quietly on. Founded on good, the movement was bound to prevail.

The speaker referred to the recent Jamboree in Australia where 11,000 Scouts were camped under ideal conditions. Australia was taking up Scouting and Guiding, and there it seemed particularly valuable and helpful in working with lone guides and scouts. This branch was also strong in New Zealand, and provided the comradeship of a great movement to isolated boys and girls.

In closing Lady Baden-Powell expressed the hope that Scouting and Guiding might make for happier, jollier, more useful citizenship in the future.

Mrs. H. D. Warren, Canadian Chief Commissioner, expressed thanks to the audience for attendance at the particular time of day. The Chief Guide had been in Canada since April 8, and had been speaking frequently three times a day since that time. The speaker could not see why Prince Edward Island with its beautiful scenery was not flooded with visitors.

In the place where united Canada was born, it was fitting that the Chief Guide should speak for almost the last time before leaving this country, Mrs. Warren remarked.

In closing the meeting Miss Williams bade the visitors God-speed on their trip across the Atlantic.
