and never yet has it failed in the at-
tempt to make these gatherings all that
could be desired.

The meet of yesterday received a
good patronage, considering the fact
that the weather had not been dealing
with the management very leniently
of late. Almost every seat on the grand
stand was filled.

The crowd went wild over some of
the finishes. They enjoyed the races,
and were much pleased with the smart
and business-like manner the officials
had the programme run off.

One of those unavoidable happenings
occurred which caused the spectators to
hold their breath for a moment. A col-
lision occurred between L. Sellar and
A. W. Gaudet. Fortunately both es-
caped. But Gaudet's bicycle was not as
fortunate as its owner and it was badly
broken. The track was in excellent
condition and the order maintained
throughout was good.

In many of the heats the contestants
crossed the finish line so nearly to-
gether that it was very difficult for the
spectators to determine the result.

Owing to illness F. R. Newsom
started in only two races, consequently
he did not make as good a showing as
usual.

P. C. Brown in the half mile Bicycle
race paced by a tandem broke the
track record, the last quarter being
covered in 29 seconds.
