

Insulin Will Be Here First

TORONTO, June 3.—The first Canadian provincial government to administer insulin to free patients through the Department of Health will probably be that of New Brunswick, says the Toronto Star.

A whole morning was spent by Dr. Roberts with Dr. F. G. Banting inspecting the diabetic clinic at the Toronto General Hospital and going into the details of the administration of the extract.

Accompanied by Mr. Donnelly, Dr. Roberts made a thorough investigation of the treatment of diabetes by the famous insulin extract and its manufacture in Toronto.

At the Connaught laboratories later on, Dr. Roberts was assured that he could be supplied with insulin by Dr. Duffries.

The only insulin centre in New Brunswick at present is the General Public Hospital at St. John.

MUSIC AN IMPORTANT ASSET IN THE HOME

CHICAGO, June 6.—The way to counteract the demoralizing and disruptive influences that draw young people more and more away from the home to seek recreation and pleasure elsewhere, is not by criticizing and attacking them, but by constructive educational work.

"With all the facilities that science and ingenuity have placed at the disposal of everybody, there is no longer any excuse for any home not having music, and good music."

Rose Covered Island In Dispute At Lausanne

BUCHAREST, June 2.—On the agenda of the Lausanne conference is an item which has baffled the world's statesmen who are trying to reestablish peace in the Near East. It is the question of the "Kadi of Ada Kaleh".

Mustapha Kemal dispatched a Kadi, or judge, to Ada Kaleh, and the Rumanian government, suspecting nothing and regarding him as only a harmless Turkish visitor granted a visa to Kemal's emissary.

When the Rumanian authorities learned that the newly-arrived Kadi had taken over the administration of the island they immediately asked him to leave Ada Kaleh, and with all honors due to Kemal's governor, the Kadi was very politely being deported from Rumanian territory.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Whether it is the act, or the actor alone which attracts vaudevillegoers was a question the Supreme Court was asked to answer in the case brought by Max Hart against the B. F. Keith Vaudeville Exchange, the Orpheum Circuit, Inc., the Excelsior Circuit Collection Agency, Inc., and others.

Hart charged that there is a vast vaudeville monopoly, directed by the Keith Exchange east of Chicago and by the Orpheum Circuit in the west, which by blacklisting has made it impossible for any author, producer, or actor to show on the first class vaudeville circuits without booking with them and subscribing to their regulations.

Alleging that the Keith Exchange and others named were engaged in interstate commerce because of the contracts they make contemplate interstate transportation of the act, Hart asked the federal district court in New York City to declare the arrangement an unlawful combination under the Sherman law.

SCIENTISTS PREPARE TO OBSERVE ECLIPSE AT CATALINA ISLAND

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 2.—When the shadow of the moon sends its diagonal dash across the Pacific September 10 next and strikes inland near Santa Catalina Island near here, pilgrims from all parts of the world will be on hand to watch the first total eclipse of the sun visible in the United States since 1918.

Regarded as the most important astronomical event of the year, the September eclipse will attract thousands of scientific men to southern California, and preparations have been made to facilitate the work of observers and to accommodate the various scientific organizations which will hold gatherings in this city in connection with the phenomenon.

DECLARES TODAY TO BE GOLDEN AGE OF MEDICINE

LONDON, June 6.—Cholera, plague, typhus, typhoid, smallpox, tuberculosis and malaria have at last become controllable, says Sir George Newman, chief medical officer of the British government. The antitoxin treatment of diphtheria has reduced the death-rate in that disease from 29.8 percent in 1890 to 9.3 percent in 1922, which means that 200 additional lives are saved in every 1,000 cases.

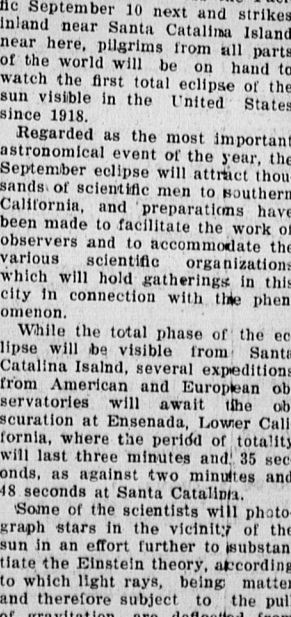
GERMAN POLICE LIFTS BAN ON OPEN AIR GATHERINGS

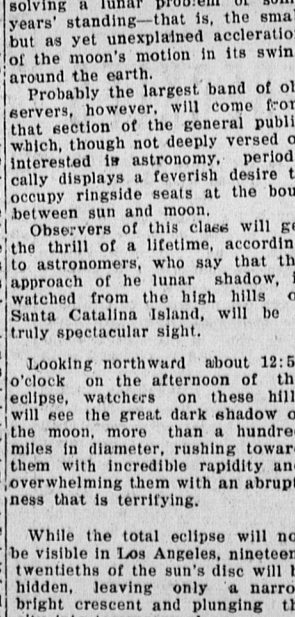
