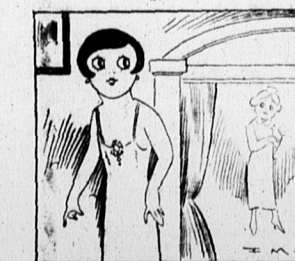

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., Sept. 10. —Westville defeated Springhill, 9 to 7, in a hectic battle today in the first playoff game for the Nova Scotia championship and now both teams stand with two wins and a draw, the last game to be played in Truro on Monday at 3 p. m.

It was not a good ball game, both teams making costly errors when they meant runs for the other side. Hatherley, who started for Springhill, was batted for seven runs in the first three innings and was replaced by John McNeill, who held the Westville batters to two runs, both of which were on the sacks when he entered the game.

Held Scoreless. Springhill was scoreless until the seventh, when Smith, the first batter, hit a double, McNeill getting first when Thompson pitched a wild third strike. Burden next hitting safe and Wilson clearing the sacks with a two bagger. O'Rourke grove in Wilson and then scored himself. Springhill scored two more in the ninth. Though both teams played loose ball, Springhill in the first few innings, and Westville in the eighth, there was plenty of excitement and it's hard to pick the winner of the next game. Discuss Formation of A Rugby League

TORONTO, Sept. 10.—In the sporting columns of the Globe this morning, Frederick Wilson, sporting editor, says: "For several years rugby in this section of Canada has been confined largely to Toronto and Montreal, and while no league has ever been formed, exhibition games have been played in Toronto, Montreal and elsewhere. Hamilton, for many decades the leading centre of Canadian football, in proportion of inquiries, now talks of taking up rugby, and will propose a league comprising Toronto, University of Toronto, Ontario Agricultural College and Hamilton. The Toronto Rugby Club is in receipt of inquiries from many players now in the district, and who formerly played for well known English clubs. The Hamilton Herald in discussing the probable formation of a Rugby League, says that many Canadians who saw the game in the Old Country are of the opinion that it is a faster, better game than Canadian football.

St. Leger Stakes Is Won By Solario

DONCASTER, Eng. Sept. 10.—Sir John Rutherford's Solario, by Gainsborough, out of Sun Vorahib, won the St. Leger stakes, his final classic of the British racing season here today. Solario came in three lengths ahead of Prince Aga Khan's Zambro, which Lord Londsdale's Warden of the Marches trailed by the same distance to take third place. The betting odds against the winner were 7 to 2, against Zambro, 6 to 1, and against Warden of the Marches, 18 to 1. Seven horses ran.

Lord Beaverbrook Joins The Turf

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Lord Beaverbrook is extending his activities. Not content with aspiring to mould the political destinies of Great Britain, he has now decided to become a leading figure on the turf, according to the Westminster Gazette. Lord Beaverbrook has never hitherto looked with a favorable eye on any personal association with the turf and has been an unfamiliar figure at Tattersall's yearling sales at Doncaster. This year, however, he purchased for 5,800 guineas, or slightly over \$30,000 dollars, one of Dudley Ward's thoroughbred colts by Gainsborough, out of Glacials, the owner previously being Lady James Douglas. It is the highest price paid for a yearling so far this year. Beaverbrook's horses will be trained by Captain Oswald Bell of Lambourne.
