The Annual Easter Concert in aid of the St. Dunstan's Cathedral building fund in the basement of the Cathedral yesterday evening was an unqualified success, that large audience room being crowded. The patrons had been promised a treat and the large number of expectants were not disappointed when the curtain lifted. The basement was exquisitely decorated for the occasion. At the front of the stage flags were suspended from the ceiling which, under the rays of the incandescent lamps was pretty indeed; the pillars were fastooned in colors; above the stage hung the Papal flag and on the right appeared the Union Jack, to the left the Stars and Stripes floated. The programme commenced with an opening selection by Prof. Vinnicombe's orchestra. To particularize the programme would be superfluous. The statutory evidenced the care taken to obtain perfection in every detail. It was under the supervision of Mr. Thomas May, whose taste and skill in such matters are on all hands admitted. The three subjects illustrated were the Nativity, the Crucifixion and the Resurrection. The various numbers were enthusiastically received and although the rule was not to permit of encores, it was difficult to carry out the precedence. At the intermission candy was served and heartily discussed. Mr. W. C. Whitlock was stage manager. The entire entertainment was most successful.

THERE was a good attendance at Charlottetown Lodge, I. O. G. T., last night. A debate "Which is the more undesirable citizen, the liquor seller or the Chinaman" was taken part in by four speakers—two on each side. A vote of the members was taken at the close when only two stood up to say that the liquor seller was the better citizen.

An exceedingly pleasant time was spent Wednesday evening at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. McLare, Grafton Street when the "Skerryvore Six" assembled to gather. There were present Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Prowse, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Stanley, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Huestis, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Light Mr. S. A. McLeod and Miss McLeod. They were entertained most pleasantly in Mr. and Mrs. McLare's very hospitable manner. It is the intention of the party to visit the homes of each of the remaining five soon as convenient.

A FULL house and eager interest were apparent when Rev. G. M. Campbell began his lecture on the War in the Crimea in the schoolroom of the First Methodist church last evening. Enthusiasm gathered as he proceeded with the graphic recital, and long before he concluded his audience were wrought up to such a pitch of patriotic enthusiasm that their applause became embarrassing by reason of its frequency and heartiness. It was with an excellent, informing, patriotic and inspiring discourse greatly aided by the stirring battle scenes which from time to time were thrown upon the screen by Mr. G. H. Hazzard. A number of the militia were present in uniform. Prof. Watts played Rule Britannia and the audience joined in the chorus, just before the lecturer was introduced. Rev. Mr. Campbell rapidly sketched the origin, growth and development of the Turkish and Russian empires, then the causes leading to the war between them, into which Britain and France were drawn. The attack of the two later was mainly directed to the Crimea, though a fleet under Sir. Charles Napier was sent to the Baltic. Rapidly the lecture carried his audience forward to the Battle of Alma, of which an eloquent description was given illustrated by vivid pictures on the canvas. The Battle of Balaclava, or rather the succession of engagements there, was also graphically described and illustrated. One seemed to see in actual life and action Sir Colin Campbell and his "thin red line" as they rolled back the tenfold force of Russians; and general Scarlett with the Heavy Brigade as they cut their way up hill through the masses of Cossack cavalry, and lastly the glorious but mistaken charge of the Light Brigade as they rode into the valley of death and back again. At this point the lecturer recited with thrilling effect Tennyson's stirring lines on that memorable event. The Battle of Inkerman was given with less fulness of detail, but most impressively the defence of the Two Gun Battery was described and illustrated. The return of the soldiers after the fall of Sebastopol closed the series of Crimean War pictures. Then the story of Dargai Ridge was briefly referred to as evidence that British valor has not declined. In an eloquent peroration the lecturer expressed his belief that in defence of British honor, fighting in a just cause and trusting in the God of justice Britain would ever be victorious. Great applause rolled up at the close of the eloquent lecture, which occupied an hour and a half in delivery.—Among the scenes thrown upon the canvas during the evening in addition to the battle pictures, were ships of the British navy of the Crimean days and the present, types of British soldiers. Florence's Nightingale caring for the sick and wounded, &c. The vote of thanks was moved by Hon. Mr. Brechen seconded by Mr. John McPherson, and carried with a great clapping of hands.
