He was taken to the home of Mrs. Rudge adjoining his former home and afterwards was sent to the Hospital by order of the Attorney General.

The House met yesterday afternoon and last night, contrary to the usual custom, in order that the debate on the Budget should be concluded and the House go into committee of Supply. Capt. Read, Mr. Currie, Dr. Warburton, Mr. Arsenault, Mr. McIsaac, and Hon. Mr. Simpson were the speakers the last moving the adjournment at midnight.

The little eight year old son of W. S. Robertson, Bothwell who has been at the P. E. I. Hospital for the past three weeks was removed yesterday almost completely recovered. The little boy was suffering from one of the severest cases of appendicitis ever met with by those in charge and for a long time the lad's life was in doubt. The operation was one of the most successful ever performed at the Hospital and the little lad is now on a fair way to complete recovery.

An sudden death from the effects of bad liquor was narrowly averted several days ago in the city and had it not been for the efforts of the physician summoned the victim would without doubt have died in a short time. The man in question is well known in the city and was taken to his home in a dead drunk. A physician was summoned at once and worked with a stomach pump for considerable time before any vitality was apparent. He succeeded however in restoring consciousness and after administering restoratives the man was able to be around again.

It is with more than ordinary regret that the announcement of the death was heard yesterday of Roy Davison, one of the most popular young men of this city, which took place about noon at the home of his father, J. Milton Davison, Prince Street. The deceased had been ill since January last but until several weeks ago good hopes were held out for his recovery. A relapse occurred however and for the past few days the end was hourly expected. The deceased young man who was twenty-one years of age, subsequent to his illness occupied a position as clerk in the Bank of Nova Scotia. Among a large circle of friends he was universally liked and many will sincerely mourn his early death. With the bereaved parents and other relatives The Guardian deeply sympathizes.
