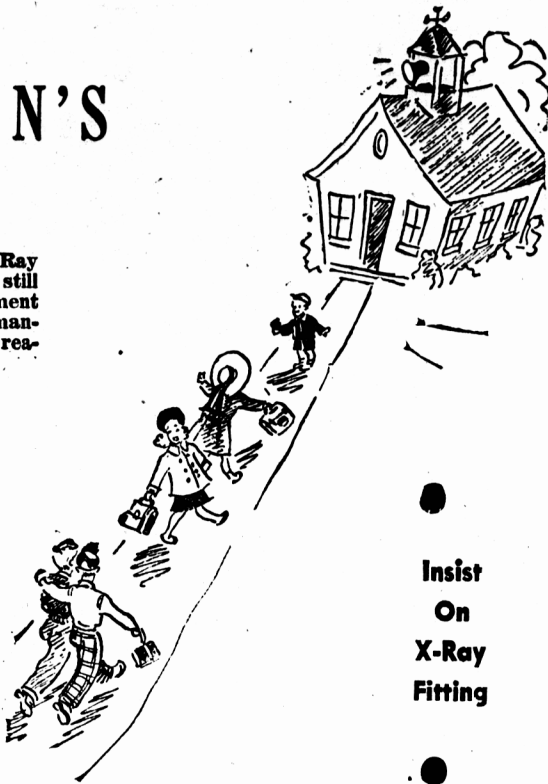

Heavy Docket At Summerside

There was a heavy docket before Magistrate R.S. Hinton, K.C., in Summerside yesterday. A man from Kensington was fined \$200 and costs or three months for unlawful sale of intoxicating liquor. A Summerside man was given three months in jail without the option of a fine for the same offence, it being a second offence. A Kensington party was fined \$25 and costs for illegal possession under the Temperance Act and persons from Richmond, St. Raphael and St. Nicholas respectively were given similar fines for the same offence. A Kensington man was fined \$35 and costs or three months for illegal sale of extracts and a woman from Portage was fined \$10 and costs for the same offence. A Summerside female was fined \$200 and costs or three months for illegal possession, and a person from Wilmet Valley was fined \$20 and costs for illegal possession. A speaker was fined \$5 and costs and an indecent assault case as well as several other Temperance Act cases were adjourned. — S.
