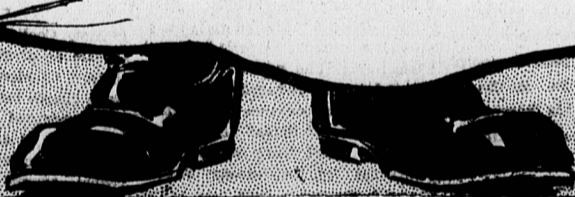

POTATO SEED INSPECTION

(Experimental Farms Note)

Creditable progress has been made this year in the production of certified seed potatoes, according to George Partridge of the Botanical Division, Central Experimental Farm. The standard of qualification during the past season was considerably higher than formerly applied. Added to this was a somewhat adverse climatic condition prevailing in many of the greatest potato producing areas. "In such localities," states Mr. Partridge, "the most vigorous and disease-free strains of potatoes were put to severe tests, but in most instances were able to withstand the unfavorable growing conditions and to furnish an interesting object lesson on the value of good seed when compared with strains of less vigour and disease freedom growing in the same locality." A total of 1,297 applications was received and 2,914 fields containing in all 9,631 acres were inspected. The majority of these fields received two, and in some cases three inspections. The following table gives a comparison of the acreages and the result of inspections in the various provinces. Of this acreage 73.3 per cent. passed the final tests. In 1922 the percentage was 62.1.

Germans to Build Airships in Akron

(United Press)

AKRON, O., Dec. 7.—The arrival here this month of a score of German aeronautical experts will mark the beginning of the world's largest organization for the development of lighter-than-air craft.

Purchase of all patent rights on German Zeppelins, including developments since the war, opens the way for unlimited experimentation in the new world, according to officials of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, who brought the patents to this country.

The experts, Goodyear officials said today, will be asked to concentrate their efforts on the commercial value of the giant craft which are to be built here, with a view to making them practically as trans-continental and trans-oceanic carriers.

Discussing the work to be done here, P. W. Litchfield, vice-president and general factory manager of the Goodyear company, said he had taken advantage of the present economic and political chaos in Germany to bring the patents to America but that most of the development would be in charge of German technicians.

"The leading Germans in this line know that more progress can be made in this country and they are eager to get busy with their ideas," Litchfield said.

"This is a new experiment for us—building rigid airships—and our first steps are going to be taken with care."

Litchfield is confident that in a short time ships much longer than the great Shenandoah will be launched here as carriers of freight and passengers. The Zeppelins are to be constructed in plants at Wingfoot Lake Field, near Akron.

"We have been promised the whole-hearted support of the United States government," Litchfield said. "We expect to supply the demand for speed in commercial transportation."
