CLOSING SESSIONS OF CONFERENCE

Filled With Much Interest to those in attendance—Matters of Importance Dealt With—Optimistic View of Gospel's Progress.

TUESDAY MORNING.

The Conference opened yesterday as usual, President Lodge in the chair. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

Rev. George Steele read a communication from Rev. Dr. McLean, Editor of the Wesleyan, sending greetings and urging increased support from the Methodists so as to bring up the circulation of the paper to the 1000 mark aimed at this year. Mr. Steele commended the good work carried on in connection with the book room. There had been a slight decrease in the circulation of the Wesleyan, but an increase in income.

Many of them thought the Book Room was in better condition than it has been for the last 15 or 20 years.

The report of the Ministerial Session was read and adopted.

Rev. A. D. McCully A. B. B. D. presented the report of the Board of Examiners, Dr. Paisley was appointed chairman and Rev. A. D. McCully, secretary.

Rev. G. Steele presented report of the Treasurer of Children's Fund. The Children's Fund reported that they recommend that superintendent at of the Bifedford Circuit be requested to obtain from the sum of ten dollars for the Children's Fund.

Rev. T. Marshall read the Missionary committee report.

It was recommended that the time for holding the Annual Missionary meetings on the circuits be in the fall; the general missionary representatives, Rev. Dr. Evans, and J. Hunter White, were requested to give a black-board lesson on how to make out the District reports. It was recommended that a Bible School of Missions be held to be addressed by the missionary touring party to be in the provinces this summer. The place suggested was Moncton. It was fully discussed.

Dr. Sprague moved that the summer schools of missions be held in the city of St. John and that each circuit become responsible for one delegate, at least, to meet their own expense. This was carried.

The committee to carry out the arrangements was appointed as follows:

One minister and one layman from each circuit in St. John and the chairman of each district as corresponding members.

The church property committee recommended that the property at Margate be sold and the proceeds be devoted to the building of a manse at Kensington.

Mr. Evans by the aid of a blackboard showed the methods of computation of the receipts from mission stations.
