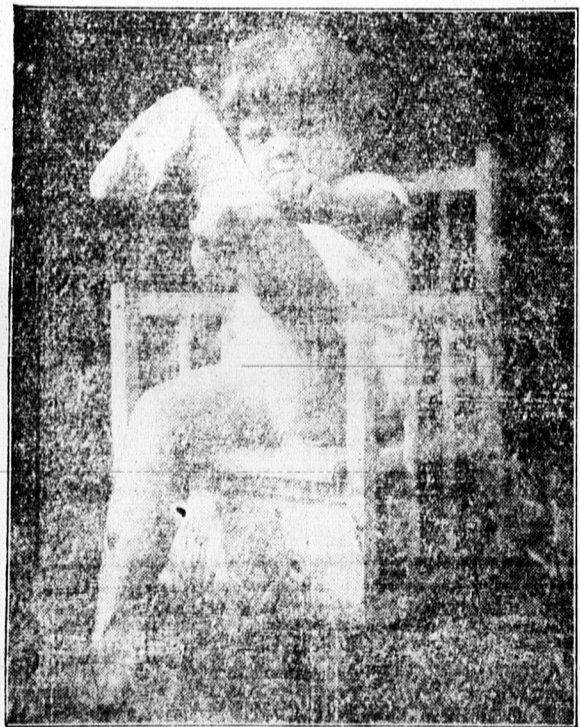

Again the owner of a camera with an f.2 lens more frequently uses apertures equivalent to those in ordinary cameras because, for most of his picture-taking, he does not need the f.2 aperture.
