THE May number of the Canadian Magazine contains the first of a series of six articles to be published, entitled When the Dominion was Young, written by J. E. B. McCready, Editor of The Charlottetown Guardian.

Her outward cargo from here consisted of 1500 bags oats, 500 bags potatoes and sundry other freight, under deck. She also took 100 head cattle, 3 horses and 50 sheep on deck.

The letter was signed by a committee consisting of Daniel McDonald, James McPhail, and Archie McKenzie.

THOSE of the residents of this Province who are shareholders of Standfield's Limited, will be interested to learn that McDonald Bros., of Truro, have been awarded the contract for erecting the following buildings for Standfield's Limited for the manufacturing of worsted yarns: The main building is 158 feet long by 111 wide, three storeys high; power house 82 feet by 30, one storey; boiler house 70 feet by 40, two storeys; annex to spinning mill 85 feet by 57 two storeys; large chimney, pump house, water tanks, etc., for fire purposes, all to be built of brick. It will take over one million bricks, 2000 barrels concrete and 112 tons of castings to complete this contract.

LAST night in Columbus Hall, J. E. B. McCready, Editor of The Guardian lectured to an appreciative audience. His subject was Reminiscences of Parliament Hill, and from a memory stored with incidents gathered during his career as a newspaper correspondent at Ottawa, in the days of the early history of Canada as a Dominion, he brought forth many facts and stories connected with that interesting period. The initial performance of Jere McAuliffe's Stock Co's, present engagement at the Opera House, was last night attended by an audience that overfilled the seating capacity of the house. The play put on was The Man o'War's Man, and it was especially well done. In fact many of those who attended were surprised at the high standard attained, and the ability with which the different roles were sustained in this somewhat exacting play. That the complex plot proved interesting goes without saying, and that its interest was made more enjoyable by the manner in which the parts were taken and the action of the play interpreted is only to say what was pleasantly apparent to all. To all the members of the cast is praise due; to Wm. Howatt, and to Margie Dow, in particular is due merited recognition of clever work compelling interest and sympathy. Jere, as usual, in the comic role was inimitable, and the rest of the company gave good support. Theirs was, besides the liberal entertainment provided by the play, a generous list of vaudeville specialties, all good; not to make mention of the trained animals, which many will think entitled to a large share of attention. It requires not much of a prophet to prophesy large houses for Jere during his stay here.

A WELL DRESSED, well put on play, by clever juveniles, was rewarded with but half a house last evening. Those present enjoyed the jaunt to childhood's enchanted fairyland and became filled with the old time enthusiasm. The name role was assumed by Eric Warburton, amusing as the best, as the prince. His fondness for sweetstuff as Bruin continued when he doffed his chocolate hood, for as the Prince he wanted the Sweet Snow Drop (Dorothy Longworth). The atmosphere of a palace was not congenial to this fragile flower or her sister Rose Red (Helen Woodroffe) pearly dew glistened on their cheeks when their curly hair turned into a potatoe. Graceful little sprights were these two blossoms while the character of mother was in the dignified charge of Louise McCready, Red Riding Hood (Beatrice Dimock) stings very sweetly; every word was clearly enunciated as in her declamation. The role of Princess was assumed by her sister Margery Dimock. A petulant princess, maybe but certainly very well portrayed. The comic elements were in good hands in Hopo my Thumb (Jack Woodruff), and the dwarfs orimps or wizards or what you will, excellently exemplified by Ernest Weeks and Gordon Peters. The performance was meritorious in make up, dress, delineation and deportment. Entr'acte numbers were a violin solo by Arthur Warburton and a recitation (The Painter) by Nora Warburton. These with the orchestral selections were warmly applauded. A repetition on an evening free from other entertainments would I am sure be greeted by an audience sized to the merits of the performance.
