Bombed Presbyterian Church Gets Cheque from Beaverbrook

LONDON, Feb. 19 — (CP). — Lord Beaverbrook has sent a cheque for \$100,000 to the Presbyterian Church of England following the recent V-bomb catastrophe in which all the church's staff were either killed or injured. The publisher's father was a Presbyterian minister in Canada. Four officials of the church were killed when the V-bomb crashed in front of the church Monday. A conference of Presbyterian ministers and laymen from many parts of England was in progress when the bomb struck. The church moderator Rt. Rev. A. P. Marcus, escaped because he reached the hall a few minutes late. Just as he approached, part of the building was blown to fragments.
