**Lauds Author's Canadian Study**

NEW YORK, May 11—(CP)—"A judicious combination of anecdote, topography and philosophy," is T. Morris Longstreth's new book "Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa," recently published by the Century press, according to the New York Sun's reviewer.

It is compared with other works of the author, namely "The Adirondacks" and "The Laurentians" and is described "as interesting and instructive as either."

Says the review in part: "He has the unfortunately all-too-rare virtue of reading and remembering the original authorities, and quoting them with discretion and accuracy—he appreciates the terse but expressive prose of Jacques Cartier, not unnaturally wondering why educators have overlooked this, Canada's first, author, 'distinguished by interest, vivacity and truth,' and his 'immortal little manuscript'—the 'Jesuit Relations,' 'Better reading and better writing than the life work of many esteemed as writers'—Wolfe's versatile letters," as well as Duncan Campbell Scott's short poem, described by Masfield as "the most beautiful sea poem of modern times"—all these are quoted with admiration.

"About half of the 300 pages, not unnaturally, devoted to the 'Ancient Capital,' Quebec, the unique, where every street has ever had a majestic gait, though were the author sentenced to be imprisoned in a Canadian city for the rest of his days, he would choose Montreal, that 'Circé of its citizens,' while his love and admiration for Ottawa he exhibits in every line. 'Quebec, the city of a peopled past; Montreal, the city of a momentous present; to Ottawa, the future.'"
