PEACE IN PROSPECT.

The civilized world will learn with great satisfaction of the temporary cessation of hostilities in Manchuria, pending negotiations for peace. It is a great thing to have the work of slaughter suspended, if only for a time. We trust that peace may be shortly restored upon a satisfactory and permanent basis, but we cannot forget that there are great difficulties in the way of such a consummation. The negotiations may be long; they may even fail of success. The belligerent powers are wide apart in regard to what would be fair terms of settlement. Still we shall hope for the best. Russia has little prospect of retrieving her disasters by continuing the war and her internal troubles are also very grave. These conditions tend to peace. Japan has no desire to continue the war and Japanese statesmanship is wise enough not to insist upon terms more onerous to her adversary than are necessary for the future security of Japan. Under such circumstances the restoration of peace ought to be now possible.

The Tunnel at Cape Traverse on July 5th promises to be an event of provincial importance and of the greatest general interest.

That is a fine touch of The Examiner to invoke the Golden Rule in favor of the demand for exclusive privileges for the Driving Club. Those who quote the Golden Rule should be willing to practice it. No greater perversion could be made of that rule than to make it the plea for exclusive selfish gratification. If the Club were actuated by the principle of the Golden Rule they would not be asking for more than their just rights, or to interfere with the just rights of others.

It is gratifying to learn that The Maritime Merchant, will join in the effort to keep the Tunnel scheme prominently before the country. The Merchant holds a position of wide influence as the foremost trade journal in Eastern Canada and has all along given much intelligent attention to improving the means of communications between different sections of the country. The Tunnel project is there fore quite in its line. Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have a business interest only second to that of Prince Edward Island in the construction of this important work. We trust also that the coming session of the Maritime Board of Trade, which meets at Yarmouth August 16th may deal with this matter in an energetic and progressive spirit.

ANOTHER WINTER STEAMER.

Through all the agitation for improved communication with the Mainland two objects have been steadily kept in view, a stronger and better winter steamer as soon as it can be provided, to be followed by the construction of a railway tunnel. However much second in importance the steamer may be, it has always been placed first in order of time. It will take time to build the Tunnel and it is urgent that the best that can be done by improved winter navigation shall be done in the meantime. This was the view taken by our Board of Trade, by the People's Convention and by the Legislature. It has been enforced by resolutions, memorials and by two successive delegations sent to Ottawa. There ought therefore to be no delay in ordering the construction of the new and powerful ice-breaking steamer so urgently needed. It should be ready for service by mid-winter of 1906 if possible. The time is short and is rapidly running away. Prompt action is necessary if the Island is to be secured against a repetition of last winter's intolerable experience.
