## THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.

This is King Edward's birthday. He was born at Buckingham Palace on 9th November, 1864, and is now sixty-five years of age. As a son he honored his father and mother, and they were worthy of honor. As Prince of Wales and heir apparent he travelled all over the vast British Empire to make himself acquainted with his Kingdom and his people. When he came to the throne he showed his reverence for his dead mother by directing that her birthday rather than his own should be celebrated with royal honors. As a Sovereign, he has shown rare wisdom and tact, justice, good will and a love of peace that has won for him the title of The Peacemaker. For so good and wise a King, Queen Alexandra is a worthy and noble consort. All ranks and conditions of men and women throughout the Empire and the world honor and revere the King and Queen, of the British Isles. Long may they reign!

All honor to the brave men, who at the peril of their lives went out and rescued three sailors from the wreck yesterday! The age of heroes is not past.

The long-continued and violent storm which is still upon us has been fearfully destructive of both life and property on our Island shores and in the Gulf. It is pitiful to read of the perils, suffering and death of men doomed to die in the prime of manhood and in the sight of those who are willing but powerless to help them.

It is gratifying to note that both The Patriot and The Examiner quote from and express general approval of the sentiments expressed in Dr. Jenkins' letter on the subject of electoral reform. We learn that a number of citizens have sent in their names to Dr. Jenkins, being desirous of promoting such an organization as has been proposed.

It was praiseworthy to send the Stanley to the assistance of the shipwrecked sailors on the north shore, but to have had the best chances of success the steamer should have been sent earlier. Be that as it may we fear that the winter steamer, with her considerable draft of water could not have got near enough inshore to have rendered effectual aid. But had the chances been more favourable, one disagreeable and delaying condition would have still been in the way. Even to save life, if it seems, the Government steamer, can not be used without orders from Ottawa.

In the case of the ships wrecked on our shores during the recent storm little help could be rendered from the seaward side during the gale. The only hope for perishing seamen rested on what they could themselves do with assistance from the shore. Those on land were powerless for lack of appliances. There are no lifeboats, life lines rockets or other useful equipment. As well try to fight a roaring conflagration without fire engines, hoses and ladders. It is cruel that these conditions exist. Better preparations must be made for the future. We can all now see how great and criminal the neglect has been. Our public men, and newspapers and the general public, have been wise after the event in this matter, or too busy with other things to think of this when preparation might have been made.

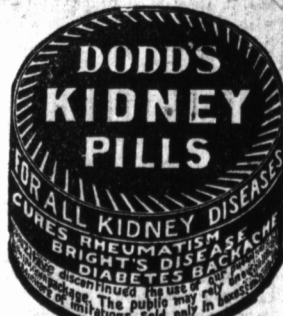
## UNITED STATES ELECTIONS.

Our neighbors get tremendously excited over an election such as that just held and even more so when once in four years they elect a President. (So do we in our federal elections.) Across the border the Governors, and State Legislatures have mostly two-year terms, and a host of other officials are elected at the same time, including a Lieutenant Governor, the officials of the State Executives (corresponding with our Provincial Cabinet Ministers) in some States the Judges of the State Courts, District Attorneys, Sheriffs and so on, Members of the House of Representatives at Washington are elected at the same time, where vacancies exist, and the complexion of the newly elected State Legislatures determine the political complexion of the National Senate, as the Legislatures elect the Senators.

Not all the States elect their Governors and Legislatures in the same year. This year twenty-three States have elected Governors and twenty of them have elected Legislatures. Generally speaking throughout the nation there has been very little change in the strength of the two great political parties. In other words the dominance of the Republican party is maintained in a majority of the States and in Congress. A much bigger fight will take place two years hence when the President of the nation will be chosen, and as many more Governors, Legislators and officials of various ranks and conditions as have just now been chosen.

It so happens that when our republican neighbors have an election it is a vast succession of criminal prosecutions and trials. The speeches of the campaign orators and spellbinders are the speeches of the prosecuting counsel in the criminal courts. Every candidate indicts the candidate of the opposing party, and the party too, as guilty of high crimes and misdemeanors. The listener at a campaign meeting will learn that the candidate of the other party is a very reprehensible person, maybe a traitor, a coward, a tool of the corporations, a man who is the associate of grafters and knaves, of gamblers and thieves and all the worst characters in the country. We need not wonder at this. In fact political campaigns in Canada are only a little behind those of the United States in this regard, and we are going in the same direction.

It is not a good way to those law makers and rulers, to force upon the people a choice between criminals to be

lifted to high places, but let that pass. Many of the candidates are not half so black as they are painted. There are still many honest and patriotic men in the public life of the Republic, but no method could be readily contrived which would more certainly confuse the public mind as to the real character of the men who are up for election, or the real merits of the contending parties and opposing policies. An election is always a very strenuous conflict, with much violent language and railing of opponents, bribery, perjury, drunkenness, intimidation and violence, but still preferable to armed revolution such as must occur but for the periodical electioneering blow-out.

As between Hughes and Hearst what was behind each of them, we do not think there was very much to choose. Doubtless Hughes is the more reputable person of the two, probably not the ablest, and it may be doubted whether his occupation of the Governor's chair will contribute more to the general welfare than would the elevation of Hearst to that position. It is true that Hearst's newspapers are yellow and sensational, but they have done the State some service; that the bulk of the clergy and almost the entire newspaper press except his own condemned him; that he was written down and condemned as a bad and dangerous man, and that hosts of good people voted against him on that ground. But in New York City where Hearst's newspaper, circulated widely among the opposing journals, he carried a large majority at the polls. Up the state where few people comparatively read the Hearst journals, the majority was for Hughes.

The money power, the lawless trusts and corporations in association with better elements, have triumphed in the election of Hughes. During the campaign they traded upon his personal respectability. It may be doubted whether even Tammany is more corrupt and lawless than the Republican machine. Had Hearst been elected he would have had great responsibilities thrust upon him which might have checked his growing power and popularity. He would have been forced to undertake important reforms, greater than can be hoped for from Hughes with the influences controlling him. Hearst is still at large, a more conspicuous figure than ever before; his half a dozen great newspapers will go on circulating with increasing numbers; the conditions that called Hearst to the front and so nearly carried him to victory still exist. Hearst is not killed. He must be reckoned with at a future day in a bigger fight than that of Tuesday last.

In Time of Peace.
