**C.C.F. Speaker Here From Saskatchewan**

"The farmers of this nation have been betrayed by their government into the hands of the millers," said Percy Wright, M.P., Saturday evening. Speaking in the M.I.O. hall, Mr. Wright pointed out that at the time of decontrol fifty million bushels of coarse grains had already passed out of the hands of the farmers. Moreover, a regulation was passed by the feed administration three months ago which prevented serious consumers of feed grains from purchasing more than two months supply. "If the government felt that controls must be given to the millers, then those controls should have been handed over during harvest so that the farmer would have benefited from the price increases," said the C.C.F. member. "As it was," he stated, "the speculators and millers cleaned up twelve and a half million dollars which the growers should have had." "Only a government more interested in a corporation profits than in the welfare of the farmer, would have done such a thing," said Mr. Wright.

The Saskatchewan Member went on to point out that today packing plants are working overtime across Canada processing the animals which farmers can no longer afford to keep. "The Corporation has agreed with this policy all along," concluded the speaker. "Only the C.C.F. has fought to retain proper price control in the hands of the farmer. A vote against the C.C.F. is a protest against this kind of policy."

Mr. Raeford Locke, C.C.F. candidate for Second Prince also spoke briefly on the need of a Provincial Government free of monopoly control. "Rural electrification is possible here," he stated, "only if the power industry is brought under public ownership and the profits from the thickly settled areas used to build the rural lines."

Chairman of the meeting was Oliver Correll of M.I.O.

**ELIXIR OF LIFE FAILS, MAGICIAN DIES AT 72**

HASTINGS, England, Dec. 7.-A. Alastair Crowley, magician and mystic, claimed that when he was 40 he had distilled and drunk the true elixir of life supposed to prolong life forever. Tonight, at 72, he died.

Crowley, centre of fantastic stories, once said of himself: "I have called me the world man in the world." They have accused me of doing everything from murdering women and throwing their bodies into the Seine to drug peddling.

Eighteen years ago when he was refused the right to live in France, Crowley denied practising black magic.

Crowley lost a libel action he brought in 1934 over statements in a book "Laughing Torso," in which it was stated he had practised black magic in Sicily.

After leaving Cambridge University, Crowley travelled in China and Tibet. He claimed he could make himself invisible and had walked in a sash and gold robe with a jeweled crown, unseen by anyone.
