**THE ARMY ESTIMATES.**

LONDON, March 2.—Mr. Brodrick, the war secretary, has issued a statement of the army estimates for 1901-1902. The total is £87,915,000 of which £58,230,000 comes under the heading of war services and is based on the assumption that for the first four months of the new fiscal year the field force in South Africa will be maintained at its full strength and that thereafter a gradual diminution will occur.

The total estimates for the previous year were £88,999,400, which included the supplementary estimates.
