The latest news, first of all. Mrs. J. H. Gaudet, Summerside, was at the Grand Union Hotel, St. John, on Monday. Hale Strong of the Bank of N. S. McNeill, left yesterday morning to meet him, but on arrival at Moncton Mr. Campbell was too weak to continue the journey and was taken to the general hospital at that place.

Joseph Read and C. A. McArthur, Capt. Read left for Chatham yesterday morning and Mr. McArthur leaves this morning. Hampton, N. B., lost one of its most respected residents in the death of Freeman Alward, which occurred Saturday about noon, at his residence, Hampton Station, after a lingering illness of six or seven years. Born at Havelock fifty-nine years ago, a son of the late John Alward, he continued to reside there until a little more than two years ago, when he came here and purchased the property where he died. In religion he was a consistent Baptist; in politics a strong Conservative; and in society a good neighbor and firm friend. After service at his late home at noon on Monday, his body will be taken on the C. P. R. train to Petitediac, and thence to Havelock for interment. Besides his widow he leaves one son, Herbert, manager of the First National Bank at Kalspell, Montana, and four daughters—Fannie, Emily, Louise and Hattie, all at home. He also leaves three brothers—Dr. Elias Alward, K. C. of St. John; Nelson, of Summerside, P. E. I.; and Willard, of Denver, Colo.; and four sisters—Mrs. Wm. Fowler, of Everett, Mass.; Mrs. O. N. Price, of Havelock; Mrs. Cantwell and Miss Sarah, of Denver.—St. John Telegraph. An unfortunate clash occurred Saturday evening at St. Eleonore between a number of so-called Go-Preachers who have been holding a convention and some citizens of that locality. There were, it is said, about 100 delegates present and it would appear that they came expecting trouble and they found it. Two of the preachers, we are informed, officiated on Sunday with eyes blackened and bearing other marks of the fight on the opening night. The trouble arose when the Go-Preachers were referred to as Mormons. Thereupon the Go-Preachers berated the boys for their ill manners, and punks of coal were hurled upon the boys with good effect. One young man William Arsenault, received a bad cut on the face. A brother of the injured man then used a hammer effectively on the head of a Go-Preacher. The fight then became general. Stones flew in all directions, several parties receiving wounds, but none serious. Monday night the trouble was repeated. An attempt on the part of some outsiders to set fire to the fence near the tents was frustrated. The Go-Preachers drew revolvers, the outsiders did likewise. A number of shots were fired but no one was hit. Stones and other missiles were thrown and several windows in the houses close by were broken. During the night the Go-Preachers folded their tents, and the Convention was over, much to the relief of the people of that section. The Convention was held in a large tent, the delegates occupying smaller tents close by when the meetings were not in progress. The present whereabouts of the preachers is unknown.—Pat.
