CAPE COLONY.

Cape Colony has been a subject of new interest from the announcement that its Parliament is to be called together again next month, and from the doubt that exists in many minds as to the advisability of taking this step. There can be no doubt that during the year or more now past, during which the constitution has been suspended, the effect has been to hasten the restoration of peace and order. So long as the war was in progress it was clearly best that the Colony should remain under martial law. The peace has given new conditions. But Lord Milner has held firmly to the view that the suspension of the constitution should be continued for some time in the future.

Lord Milner knows the country and the people well and the general public of the Empire has confidence in his soundness of judgment upon most South African questions. Moreover Lord Milner is reinforced in his view by some forty-five members of the Cape Legislature making very nearly half its membership. These forty-five had petitioned the Governor to suspend the constitution in the first instance and think the suspension should continue yet longer. They desire that the Legislature shall not be called until the time when the passions aroused by the war have had time to cool. Lord Kitchener was of the same opinion as Lord Milner, and the Boer General Botha since the peace and his reconciliation is credited with the same view.

It is to be observed that the forty-five members of the Legislature who favored the introduction of martial law in the first instance and now desire its continuance, are mainly made up of English-speaking persons who have all along been loyal to the British flag. Those of Dutch descent, the Afriander population, who are also in the majority both in the Legislature and the country, desire the immediate restoration of legislative powers. Sir Gordon Sprigg, the Premier of the Cape has strongly urged this view, and has been successful in persuading the Home Government to adopt it. The decision is to trust the people all in all, notwithstanding that but a few months ago the majority of them were very recently in strong sympathy with Great Britain's enemies. It is a somewhat critical venture, but it may turn out all right. It ought to be the safer from the fact that the dream of a Dutch federation to control all South Africa has now been rudely dispelled.

The Ontario political situation is now a Liberal majority of one, with one seat vacant which was carried by a Liberal at the general election. There are six of the seats on each side contested in the courts.

The great anthracite coal strike is now been running about eight weeks at an estimated direct cost of about \$48,000,000. To the miners the loss is irrevocable, unless they can force an advance of wages, which seems unlikely. The mine-owners will easily make good all their losses by imposing higher prices on consumers. The public loss by the strike will never be known.

The public are asking why the prohibition cases before the Court are being adjourned from week to week; why warrant are not immediately issued as under the Scott Act for witnesses who refuse to appear in court; what Prosecutor Campbell is doing to earn the public money which he receives and sundry other related questions.

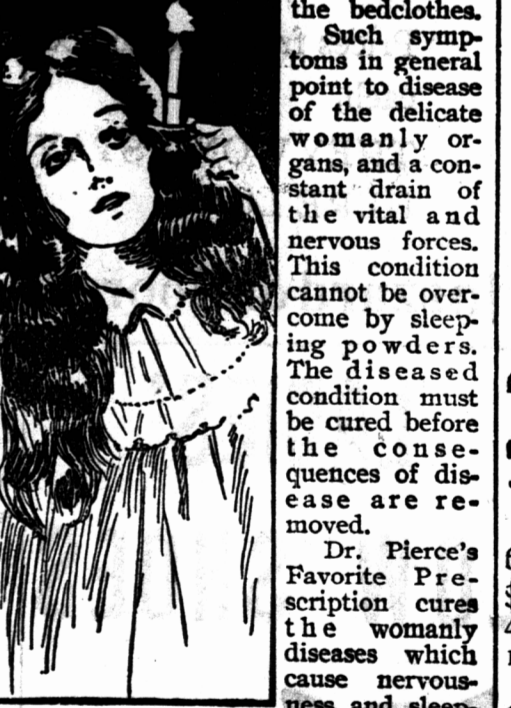
Following the strike on the Toronto street railway with an advance of pay there, the Montreal Street Railway Company gave an advance of 10 per cent to its conductors and motormen. The Ottawa Street Railway, complaining of poor business owing to cold and wet weather has refused the advance asked for by its employees.

The Marconi station at Glace Bay, C.B., has been for some time completed, and Marconi is now on his way across the Atlantic on board an Italian warship which has been placed at his disposal by the Government of Italy. He is conducting experiments as he comes. Should the great experiment of wireless telegraphy across the Atlantic prove successful, of which there are very strong hopes, we shall soon have it in actual working for commercial and press business.

We sincerely regret to learn of the serious illness of Sir John Bourinot, Clerk of the House of Commons. He has filled that important position with distinguished ability during the past twenty-two years, attaining the honor of Knighthood in that connection and for his eminence as a text writer on constitutional subjects. For years previous to his first official appointment he had been connected with the newspaper press. In association with the late Mr. Crookill he established the Halifax Reporter in 1880, and was for years its editor. Sir John enjoys a very wide acquaintance and friendship among the leading public men, journalists and literary men and women of the Dominion. He was born in 1837.
