CARUSO'S POPULARITY

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—More than 2,000 men and women were in line in front of the Metropolitan Opera house today when the box office was opened for the sale of tickets for next Wednesday's performance of "Carmen" which probably will be the last time that Caruso will sing in the role of Don Jose before leaving for Monte Carlo. Just across the street were scores of ticket speculators, nearly all of whom had representatives in the long line. Many were waiting to buy tickets have stood in the cold since midnight and by four o'clock this morning the line had turned the corner of Broadway, extending nearly all the way to Seventh Avenue.

The King and Queen paid a delightful surprise visit to the wounded Indian soldiers at the Royal Pavilion, Brighton, on Saturday.

King George, who has a knowledge of Hindustani, stopped at many of the beds and talked to the men, Colonel Campbell, the administrator, explaining incidents to their fighting records. He talked for some minutes with the soldier, Gangay Singh, who has been awarded the Victoria Cross.

Two young brothers, Gurkhas, aged 17 and 16, who were wounded in a trench by the same shell, were also noticed by their majesties. One has lost his left arm and has a fractured leg, and the other is minus a leg.

In spite of their injuries they smiled cheerily when the king wished them a speedy recovery.

The queen showed a special interest in the brothers, who are named Pim and Bel, and to Bel she gave a flower.

THE IRVING BEERS RECITAL

In response to a general wish Mr H. Irving Beers, supported by a company of local artists, will give a dramatic recital in the Kindergarten Hall on Monday evening, the 15th. A fine programme is being arranged, and a great intellectual treat is in store for those who attend.

An account of his ability as an artist, Mr Beers deserves to be well patronised, and further, he deserves patronage on account of what he has done for the Patriotic Fund. Since the declaration of the present war the productions of this actor between Amherst, St. John, Halifax and Charlottetown have turned over to the Patriotic Fund \$1,231. Nearly \$400 in St. John alone, and \$213 in this city. In addition to this he has given his services free to nine patriotic concerts in the country districts—four on the Island and five in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

It might be mentioned as an evidence of the ability of Mr Beers in this line that he recited at a Masonic banquet in Toronto three years ago at which some visiting Masons from Buffalo and Rochester were present, and so great was his success that he was invited some weeks later to Rochester to recite at a Masonic banquet in Medina Temple. He was encored eight times in Rochester, and at the close of the entertainment Grand Master Hooper presented him with a purse of \$50.

On Monday evening the 15th, he will give twelve standard and contemporary poems, including "The Monarch of the North," by the Rev. Sydney P. Kendall, D.D.

ALTKIRCH IS TOO HOT FOR GERMAN GENERAL.

GENEVA, via Paris, Feb. 5.—General von Bordingen, staff commander of the German operations in Lower Alsace with headquarters near Altkirch, has been forced by allied aviators, who bombarded the headquarters, to return to Muelhausen, from which place state papers and valuable are being removed to Friedburg.

A German aeroplane fell at Mudorf, near Basle on the Swiss frontier yesterday. The two officers in the aeroplane were seriously injured, and the machine was smashed.

As a result of the new German regulations for the making of bread, several hundred bakers in southern Germany along the Swiss frontier have been compelled to close their shops.
