THE PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

The annual report on the public accounts of Prince Edward Island for the year 1904 was laid on the table of the Legislature yesterday. The report shows the receipts of the Province were \$307,730.50 and the ordinary expenditure \$336,119.51. This leaves an apparent deficit for the year of \$48,389.

In addition to the ordinary expenditure there was an outlay on capital account of \$19,760.62. The expenditure on bridges \$10,543, on rights of way, \$4,497 and on the steamer Hillsborough, \$2,829 and the larger items of this account and make up over three fourths of the total. There is almost always some question as to the rightfulness of certain charges to capital made by any Government, but all accountants recognize that there is a difference between the nature of the outlay for new permanent works and the outlay for mere current expenses.

The Province has long been on a somewhat short allowance for what may be called its housekeeping expenses. As a consequence our provincial financiers have gone on from year to year, adding to the debt the amount of the deficit on ordinary account. During the past year the deficit and capital account together make the rather formidable total of \$68,149. So that in round figures the Province expended last year all its receipts and 20 per cent more.

The importation of hay by the Government to supply those farmers whose crops were short last year makes a total of \$13,513.15 for hay and freight of which down to December 31 the sum of \$3,653 had been repaid by sales. There will also be a refund by the Ottawa Government of the amount paid in freight. Unfortunately for all concerned the hay has been long delayed on the route but when it is received and delivered the "temporary" hay account may be expected to show no adverse balance.

But notwithstanding the deficit of the past year the Province, as compared with other Provinces of the Dominion cannot be said to be in a bad way financially. We still have at Ottawa a balance to our credit which considerably exceeds our debt. Nova Scotia had a net debt in 1903 of \$3,028,807; New Brunswick's net debt was then \$3,213,946; British Columbia had then a net debt of \$8,530,878, and Quebec's net

debt was \$22,017,002. We need not therefore despair of our financial situation. But so long as we are spending from year to year more than we receive and constantly trenching upon capital the need for future economy, as well as for increasing the provincial revenue by any judicious means must be sufficiently obvious to all thoughtful persons.

BRITISH TRADE INCREASING

LONDON, April 6.—The March statement of the board of trade shows increases of \$1,455,000 in imports and \$19,005,000 in exports. The principal increase in imports was in wool \$5,494,650, but this was partly offset by the decrease in cotton \$2,874,070 and other minor items. The principal increases in exports were in fabrics, cotton \$7,099,700 and wool \$3,302,655, and machinery \$2,500,000.
