IMPERIAL FEDERATION.

There are millions of loyal subjects of King Edward who would like to see the British possessions united more closely than they are for purposes of Imperial trade, defence and legislation. Some of these have no very clear idea of what the British Empire is, the relation of the parts to the whole, or what would be the effect of forming the entire number of states and dependencies into one great federation.

One or two brief definitions may help to the better understanding of the situation. What is the British Empire? It is a great state, somewhat loosely held together under a common Sovereign; made up of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Empire of India, many self-governing communities such as Canada, Australia, New Zealand and Newfoundland, a number of crown colonies with more limited powers of self-government, and sundry other dependencies and protectorates scattered widely about the globe.

What is a federation? Here we may quote Freeman's definition: "A federal commonwealth, in its perfect form, is one which forms a single state in its relations to other nations, but which consists of many states with regard to its internal Government." Varying examples of this definition are found in the United States and Switzerland and in Canada and Australia in less fulness, because the two latter are not independent nations as the two first named are.

How could the various states, colonies and communities of the British Empire be united in one federation? Obviously this could only be effected by a mutual agreement, and by each of the several communities surrendering a portion of their powers to a central Government and Parliament. This is what was done when the British Provinces of North America joined together forty years ago to form the Dominion. Each Province gave up to the new central authority the control of its militia and defence, its customs and excise, its postal service, the control of its tariff, the making and altering of the criminal law and so on.

Of course a federation could be formed on largely different lines from those of the Dominion, but the power of the central authority, whether for legislation or administration, would be almost wholly derived from what would be surrendered by the now self-governing states. And just there is where one great obstacle in the way of imperial federation is found. The history of the past fifty years shows a steady advance along the line of extending the powers of self-government in the colonies. And the Dominion of Canada and the Australian Commonwealth are seeking still further extension of their present powers. For instance they desire the privilege of negotiating commercial treaties.

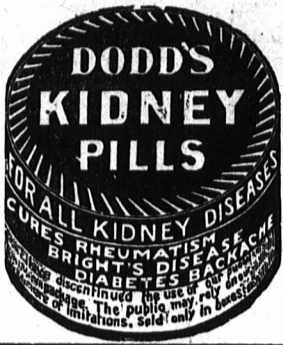
The above brief outline shows some of the obstacles to framing a federal constitution for the British Empire. There are other obstacles, as in the case of India. More than thirty years ago in a conversation with Hon. Edward Blake on this subject, he expressed to the writer his belief that imperial federation is impracticable and that any closer union of the various states of the Empire must be found in the form of a treaty or league rather than under a federal constitution. There is at present a strong desire among the units of the Empire to get together and it is an assuring and healthful symp-

tom. The process need not be hurried. The solution will be found in time by patient and loyal statesmanship, but it may be doubted whether it will come in the form of an imperial federation.

The Toronto World offers a prize for the most suitable name for the new city to be formed by the union of Fort William and Port Arthur.

A Montreal despatch tells that Mr. Borden at the recent Conference there denied that he had given any intimation of the federal elections being likely to take place before the next session of Parliament.

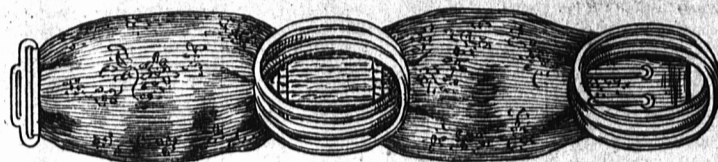

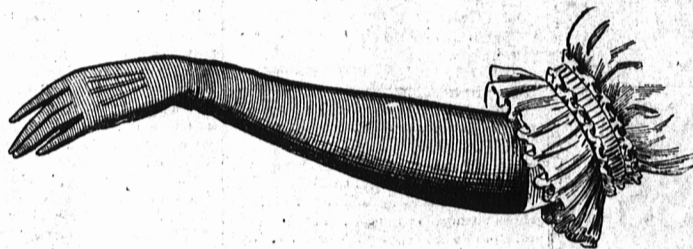
