SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

When faith, which is the mightiest principle in the soul of man, is at work in the hearts of men, pushing them to the deeds of mercy and of undaunted endeavor in behalf of others, it is found that Love, which is the mightiest attribute in God, is ready to greet them with its greatest gift and blessing—forgiveness. The faith of man may be actuated by a feeling of pity or something less. That the sick of the palsied might be able to take up his bed and walk would be an answer which completely filled their expectation. But God always gives far more abundantly and above what is asked or sought. And Jesus teaches in the lesson that the forgiveness of sins is of vastly greater importance than physical healing.

There is no need to discount the fact at the present day that Jesus Christ compassionates men because of the afflictions of their bodies, but there is a call to emphasize this other fact, that He discerns their cause. The bodily suffering of men are by no means to be always charged up to their personal transgressions, but the just relation of the one to the other is never overlooked by the Healer who alone is divine.

Jesus would have men learn this also, that the power which is demonstrated in physical healing is not the equivalent of the power which works in the moral and spiritual spheres of man's being. The electric light gives evidence of what is passing unseen in the wires, and a man raised from his bed of sickness may be as that light. He is but the evidence of unseen power, which operates in blessing in the justification and regeneration and sanctification of the souls of men, as the wire which yields the light also conveys the power from the dynamo which run a hundred factories.

It is hard to the point of impossibility to accomplish results where there is no outlooking consciousness of need. One of the most persuasive reasons for advanced missionary propaganda in our time is the sight of the outstretched hands of the millions in non-Christian lands who await our Gospel.

The Master blessed the man borne of the four when He saw their faith, and He blessed him first in the way that that was most urgent as He discerned the case. How wonderful are the eyes of Jesus! For the lesson continues to tell us that He saw a man called Matthew. He saw him, the word implies, because He looked upon him and fixed His gaze upon him in a contemplative way. He saw him through and through.

The result of the searching, testing, loving look quickly appeared. The man, despised on account of his occupation by all others, was called to be a close follower. Jesus, Christ always sees what is best in men and always makes appeal to what is best. What matters it if a thousand prejudiced and bigoted judgments are offended—the Master knows what is in man, nor can His mercy be thwarted.

The Son of Man, the significant title which Jesus takes to Himself in the lesson, and through which He reveals both His humanity and His sovereignty, demands allegiance from those in whose hearts He discerns the faith which comes from the consciousness of need and which may be

\$50,000 GIFT TO QUEEN'S ON CERTAIN CONDITIONS.

KINGSTON, March 15.—An endowment fund of \$500,000 for Queen's is assured by a donation of \$50,000, which Dr Douglas of New York has offered, on condition that certain changes be made in the constitution of the university.

Five Kingstonsians have contributed \$25,000 in contributions of \$5000 each, being Hon. William Hart, M. P.; Principal Gordon, H. W. Richardson, C. Bermingham and Ald. G. Y. Chown. This, with Mr Douglas' gift, brings the total contributions up to \$400,000, the amount which the university had to raise to secure a contribution of \$100,000 from Andrew Carnegie.

Dr Douglas' gift is for the endowment of a chair in Canadian and colonial history, of which W. L. Grant, son of the late Principal Grant, is to take charge. At the meeting of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church next July, it will be decided whether the changes on which Dr Douglas' grant of \$50,000 is conditional, will be made.
