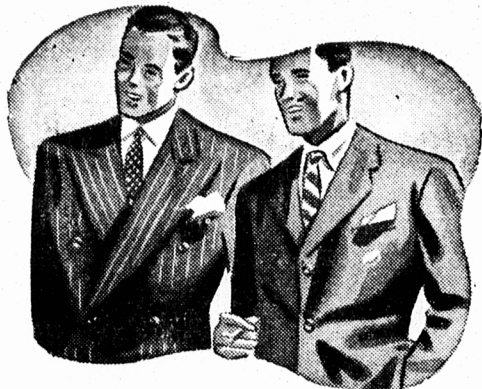


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Charge Whispering Campaign Against Wendell Willkie

BOSTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—A charge that some opponents of Wendell Willkie had launched a "stealthy whispering campaign" in an attempt to discredit him by picturing him as "practically a German" was made tonight in an attorney's statement issued by the Willkie volunteer committee of Massachusetts.

"Everywhere I go I run into this whispering," declared Alphonus Bachorowski, Salem, Mass., lawyer.

Bachorowski said the "whisperers" were implying that because Willkie's sister lives in Berlin "she forms some sort of sinister link between her brother and Hitler."

"She does live in Berlin," Bachorowski said, "and you would too if you were the wife of Commander Paul Pihl of the United States navy and naval attaché to the United States embassy in Berlin."

PUT WHEAT GERM IN WHITE BREAD

AUCKLAND, N. Z., Sept. 18 (CP)—A process for incorporating in white bread the wheat germ, source of the valuable vitamin B1, has been perfected after a year's tests by the New Zealand Wheat Research Institute. The formula has been supplied to all bakers and it is predicted that the new process will supplant wholemeal bread.

The wheat germ is removed from white flour and the stress laid by wheatians on the value of vitamin B1 has led to the use of wholemeal flour, which includes the germ. This is unpalatable to many people and some authorities maintain that the inclusion of a certain amount of husk in wholemeal is injurious.

Following recent discoveries in America of the ingredients of the wheat germ injurious to the quality of the loaf the chemists of the Wheat Research Institute have found that the harmful effect could be overcome by a process of pre-fermentation. By lengthy tests the method has been adapted to ordinary bakers' practice and it is claimed the bread thus produced as cheaply as the normal white loaf.

Four per cent of the germ, as against two per cent in a wholemeal loaf, gives bread a distinctly distinguishable from an ordinary white loaf. Feeding trials show that the nutritive qualities of the germ are retained.

FIRST NOTICES GO OUT
WINNIPEG, Sept. 18 (CP)—First notices calling up 21-year-old men for 30 days military training in Manitoba have been sent out from divisional headquarters here, Col. C. D. McPherson, registrar, announced today. He said that of the 4,000 men in this class in Manitoba, more than 2,600 will be called in the first draft.

MONTREAL MAYOR'S FAMILY

OTTAWA, Sept. 18 (CP)—Oamille H. de, interred Montreal Mayor or his family, may receive his civic salary and expenses allowance, totalling \$1,000 per month, until his two-year term of office expires next May, it is announced by Hon. Pierre Casgrain, Secretary of State, and Canadian custodian.

"I have decided with my officials that it would be only fair not to deprive his family of this money for maintenance," the Minister said. "My understanding is that the payments are to be made by the city of Montreal direct to the family of Mayor Houde."

Mayor Houde, who has been receiving an annual salary of \$10,000, plus a \$2,000 expense allowance. The question what disposition could be made of these payments cropped up when Houde's \$1,000 cheque for August became due concerning the first month of his interment. The city of Montreal made inquiries.

So far it is learned, no additional income to the Mayor has been brought to light; but this matter is being investigated officially. If it turns out that Houde has other income, the custodian will decide what may be done with it.

Perils Lessen In Motherhood And Childhood

OTTAWA, Sept. 18 (CP)—Maternal and infant mortality is on a steady decline in Canada, and in part this is due to extension in health education, according to Dr. Janet Lang, in charge of the division of maternal and child hygiene of the Canadian Welfare Council headquarters.

"The latest report shows the decline to have reached the lowest level ever recorded in the Dominion in 1938," said Dr. Lang in an interview. "Maternal mortality is recorded at 4.2 per 1,000 live births and for infants at 63 per 1,000 live births."

"Child-bearing has dropped to fourth place as a threat to the lives of women between the ages of 15 and 54. Heart disease and cancer slightly more while tuberculosis is responsible for twice as many deaths."

"Our series of letters to parents on the health and development of children from the pre-natal period to the age of 17 has aided thousands of young Canadian mothers and has had a material effect upon the death rate, I believe."

The Doctor spread out for inspection six attractively bound booklets which contain the Welfare Council letters. The first two booklets are devoted to pre-natal care for expectant mothers and a dozen letters on the care of the baby during its first year.

Dr. Lang stressed the importance of this period. "If the child is brought safely to the age of 15 months one must be thankful because more children die in the first year than in the next 10 years of life."

Pre-School Children

The third book deals with the "toddler," the "runabout" and the pre-school child. Many thousands of these books go into homes throughout the length and breadth of Canada every year. Expert advice on the prevention of accidents, treatment of colds and communicable diseases, the early detection and correction of defects, physical, mental and psychological problems are dealt with.

Such questions as bribing, punishment and how to deal with nervous children, tantrums, thumb sucking and early sex education are discussed in informal, straightforward letters which have a personal touch and are designed to untangle such knotty problems for anxious mothers.

"The First Years at School" contains 10 letters each one attractively illustrated. In it the first four years of school are examined. Several letters deal with health problems with emphasis upon means of "prevention." The parent's attention is also focused upon moral behavior and the general development of the child.

"The In-Between Years" and "To Years of Discussion" discuss frankly and sensibly all the delicate problems of boys and girls between the ages of 11 and 16 years of age.

Contributors to these booklets include psychologists, health educationists, doctors and directors of such organizations as the Boy Scouts, Big Brother and Big Sister associations and experts on delinquency.

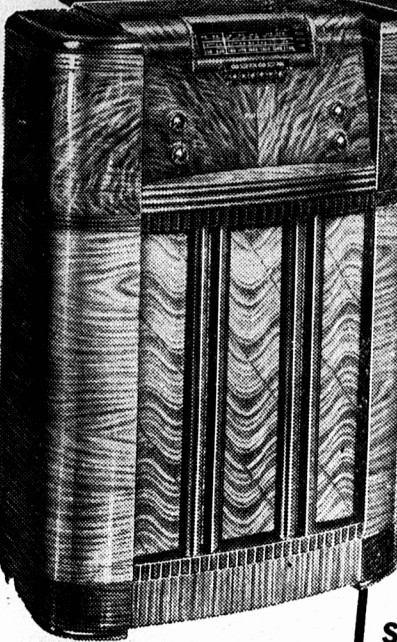
The personality of boys, their habits, discipline and ways of gaining their confidence and respect; the development of girls and their problems are discussed.

Advice about movies, books and an auxiliary service to guide parents in their selections for young children is a further part of the service covered by the booklets.

"We send out several hundreds of thousands free each year. They are distributed through departments of health, clinics, school nurses and other health organizations. Indeed we even request from many parts of the United States and not long ago a request from South America from someone who wished to translate our booklets into Spanish for use down there," said Dr. Lang.

Four of the booklets have been translated and published in French.

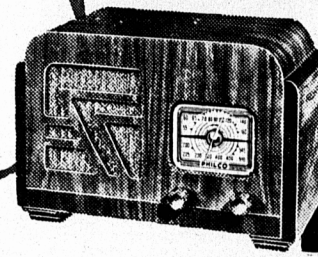

"Tough Guys" Blubber In Murder Case

NEW YORK, Sept. 18 (AP)—A pair of Brooklyn "tough guys" sobbed and blubbered in Kings County Court today—one pleading for mercy from his bosom pal of gangland—as the state dramatically closed its first degree murder case against Martin (Bugsy) Goldstein and Harry (Pittsburgh Phil) Strauss.

Seymour (Bugsy) Magoon casually admitted participating in two sayings, turned a deaf ear to the screaming plead of Goldstein and corroborated previous state testimony that Goldstein and Strauss helped harot Irving (Puggy) Feinstein, sprayed his body with gasoline and then set him afire in Brooklyn on Sept. 4, 1939.

As Magoon, the state's last witness, entered the courtroom Goldstein stood erect in the prisoner's docks, tears streaming down his cheeks and yelled: "Tell 'em Seymour, 'tell 'em the truth. My life depends on it."

REJECT DEMAND
VICHY, France, Sept. 18 (CP)—The French government has rejected demand by the government of Thailand (Siam) for territorial concessions in French Indo-China.

The foreign office, in reply to the Thailand demand, declared that France is "resolved to defend the territorial integrity of Indo-China in all circumstances and against all foreign enterprises."

Foreigners are provided with a set of cards and a number of parlor games.
