CHINESE REBELS

Driving Out Christians—20,000 Homeless.

British Ambassador's Windows Broken at Washington—Spain and the Peace Treaty—Commissioners Coming Home—Extradition—Scene in the Reichstrath—Dreyfus to Return—Murder in Africa.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—[Special]—Joseph W. Pearson is under arrest, charged with throwing stones and bricks through windows of the residence of the British ambassador, slightly injuring Miss Pauncefoot.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—[Special]—The American peace commission leave tonight for Southampton, on their way home.

MADRID, Dec. 16.—[Special]—It is understood that Spain will not likely deal with the peace treaty until the American Senate takes action, as it does not want to cede territory that the United States may not accept.

TACOMA, Dec. 16.—[Special]—Steamship advices from China report the rebels active in the province Sze Hainan. They are trying to drive out all foreigners and rid China of the Christians.

Many lives have been taken and 20,000 people rendered homeless. France has demanded redress for the destruction of French mission property. Russia is selling China a quantity of obsolete rifles.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 16.—[Special]—An extradition treaty with the United States is being prepared. The treaty is a very liberal one.

ANTWERP, Dec. 16.—[Special]—The steamship Leopoldville just from Africa, reports that four Belgian traders were killed and eaten by the natives of Upper Ubanghi Valley.

VIENNA, Dec. 16.—Another disgraceful scene took place in the Reichstrath yesterday, growing out of protests of Herr Wolf, German Nationalist, against the confiscation of his newspaper.

The various parties participated in the quarrel, including in scandalous language. It is expected that the affair will end in a duel between Dr. Frichs, President of the Chamber, and Herr Wolf.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News says it is believed that M. Dreyfus is now on the way to France.

Commercial Travellers.

HALIFAX, Dec. 15.—The seventeenth annual meeting of the Maritime Commercial Travellers' Association was held last evening.

The annual report of the directors, which was as follows, was adopted: The membership has increased from 315 in 1897 to 317 for the year now closing, but we have to report a greater mortality than in any previous year, five of our members having been removed by death, viz: W. H. Gibson, Fred L. Carten, Alfred A. Patterson, J. Fred Hoyt and Thos. C. Allen, the latter being an ex-President and one of the founders of the association.

Five claims for accident indemnity were made during the year, all of which, being approved by the board of directors, were settled promptly by the Canada Accident Assurance Co.

During the year the legislature of Prince Edward Island supplemented their obnoxious commercial travellers' tax law by an act making it obligatory upon plaintiffs, in order to recover judgment for past due debts, to show that the traveller or agent who sold the goods had paid the provincial tax. Your directors promptly memorialized the Dominion government to disallow this act, and at their suggestion the Halifax board of trade took similar action. The maritime board of trade also passed a resolution condemning legislation of this character and we are hopeful that these efforts may prove successful in defeating such an extraordinary enactment.

The directors have again to request members to report to the secretary in writing, for the attention of the board, any matters that may come to their notice during the year in the way of unsatisfactory hotel accommodation, excessive charges or abuses of any kind that ought to be remedied.

Passed Cape Race Yesterday For New Carlisle

Dr. Borden Gone to Washington—Murderess Sentenced—Monctonian Murdered in Klondyke—Steam Yacht for Palestine—Khartoum College—Canada's Minerals.

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—(Special)—Hon. Dr. Borden and family will go to Washington next week.

The Canadian commissioners are to return next Wednesday.

MONTREAL, Dec. 16.—(Special)—The steamship Caspesia of the new Canadian line, for New Carlisle, passed Cape Race this morning.

Subscriptions are being taken here for the Gordon Memorial College at Khartoum.

KINGSTON, Ont., Dec. 16.—(Special)—Rev. Dr. Evans is having a steam yacht built here for missionary work on the inland waters of Palestine.

MONCTON, Dec. 16.—[Special]—E. A. Dickson, just back from Klondyke, reports the murder there of James Cowie, a former Moncton man, in October, by a man named Burnett whom he had thrashed for circulating slanderous stories.

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—B. T. A. Bell, editor of the Canadian Mining Review, estimates that the value of Canada's mineral production this year will be \$40,000,000, and says that Nova Scotia is making relatively the best showing in gold mining. The output of gold in that province this year will be about 30,000 ounces, \$60,000 better than last year.

ST. SCHOLASTIQUE, Que., Dec. 16.—The jury in the case of Matilda Viau, accused of murdering her husband, Isidore Porrier, of St. Canute, Que., in November, 1897, last night brought in a verdict of guilty, and the Court at once sentenced her to hang on March 10th.

Parslow, who said he killed Porrier at his wife's instigation will now be tried, and the defence will now attempt to prove irresponsibility, claiming he was hypnotized by the woman.
