WORLD'S SADDLE RECORD REDUCED

CLEVELAND, August 14.—Country Jay reduced the world's record of 2:13 1/2 for trotting a mile under saddle to 2:10 1/4 at the last day of the meeting at North Randall today. Reamy Macey, son of Gus Macey, the driver rode Country Jay. The record until today was held by Charles Mack, ridden by C. K. G. Billings, of Greenville, in 1904. San Francisco's attempt to break the world record of 2:02 1/2, held by Cresceus, was a failure. Ed. Geers drove the stallion a mile in 2:04 1/2. The free-for-all pacing race proved the best one of the day. Aileen Wilson sold at \$25 to \$10 against the field at the opening and friends of Citation took considerable money at this price. Citation came home a winner by four lengths. Aileen Wilson took third place. The letting against the field, Citation was always fast but sulked in the stretch and lost by two lengths to Aileen Wilson in 2:04 1/2 in the second heat. Aileen Wilson sold at \$100 to \$15 against the field before the third heat. She won by half a length from Reapachless. The Harvester, which has not lost a heat in two years, jorged home in very heat of the 2:09 trot. Hilna B. was a disappointment in the 2:17 trot. Telemachus winning with little trouble.

YOUNG HUSBAND FIGHTS FOR PERSECUTED BRIDE



KUSHOGEE, Okla., Aug. 14.—The lengths to which white people, below the Mason and Dixon line, will go to gratify their prejudice against the negro is exemplified in the unusual case of the bride of Wm. G. Uphoff of this city. The woman, according to her husband, has a strain of one-sixteenth negro blood. Her husband was a respected real estate dealer of East St. Louis, Ill., before their marriage, three months ago. The woman is fair-skinned and as radiantly beautiful and wholesome as any woman of Muskogee. The only sign of the African blood is her thick, black wavy hair. When Uphoff brought his bride here, where he was well known and his friends and they accepted her as owns property, he introduced her to a charming, natural, well-bred and well-educated young woman. By some unknown means it was learned that Mrs. Uphoff had negro blood in her veins. That moment persecution of the couple began from all sides, and this has caused the young husband to enter into a remarkable contest with adverse public opinion. The day following the spread of the rumor that the woman was "tainted," the hotel proprietor demanded that Uphoff declare as to the truth of the report. Uphoff admitted the truth. He was told to pay his bill and leave the hotel. He said he would retire to the country if the vote were against him.

Gunners Attention

Player and Curlew shooting, on the upland, commenced July 15th. A back duck and wild duck shooting commences August 20th. The shooting of shore and other birds along the beaches, shores and marshes commences August 20th. Woodcock and snipe shooting commences September 1st. Partridge shooting commences October 1st. All nonresidents are required to take out a Game License before shooting. Wild duck must not be hunted between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise; neither on power launches or sail boats be used in hunting them. The use of a rifle in hunting Game birds is prohibited. Penalty \$10 to \$50 for each bird unlawfully killed. E. T. CARBONELL, Game Inspector.

THE SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE. Sir.—In reviewing the events of July very pleasant memories come to me of the delightful three weeks I spent in your city as a student at the Summer School of Science. I am pleased to see Mrs. French's offer of a scholarship. Her example is one well worthy of imitation and I trust that many more of our well-to-do citizens will follow her example. As the winner of one of this year's scholarships I wish to express my appreciation of the school and its work. In my opinion this institution possesses many very marked advantages which should make every teacher anxious to attend it. Let me enumerate a few of these. In the first place, there is the course of study, which is a very liberal one. The subjects taught are those which are of practical value to every teacher, and the time-table is so arranged that one may choose the course that he (or she) needs most and then spend practically all the time on that. Not only are the subjects well chosen but each instructor is a specialist in his particular work, and is therefore able to give to his students the latest and best knowledge of the subject. I wish that every teacher in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island had been able to hear Mr. DeWolfe's lectures in Botany and to go with his class on their walks. Mr. DeWolfe is a close and sympathetic student in his students a similar interest. Dr. Andrews' lecture and experiments in Chemistry and Physics were worth going to Prince Edward Island for, even had there been nothing else. For lovers of Literature there was Miss Robinson's English class which was extremely interesting and always had a full attendance. I cannot speak from personal knowledge of the work of the other members of the Faculty. I do know, however, that the classes were large, and that the interest increased steadily until the close of the session. Students of Physiology, Geology and Zoology were just as enthusiastic as those of Chemistry and Literature. Another benefit of the Summer School of Science is the constant association with the best teachers of the three Maritime Provinces, thus affording an opportunity of discussing work and methods with them and broadening our outlook. Lastly and to me a very important feature is the fact that the Summer School of Science meets at different places in successive years, and its members are therefore given an opportunity of studying Geology, Geography and other subjects at first hand, without having to refer to books written by others.
