WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 2.—International headquarters of the Salvation Army, London, England, have granted promotion to Brigadier Alice Goodwin, assistant field secretary of the army in western Canada. Canadian Good Roads Convention

TORONTO, Aug. 2.—Date of the Annual Convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association to be held in Edmonton was announced on Sept. 28, 29 and 30, by S. L. Squire, Chairman of the Association of the Executive Committee today.

Mr. Squire has recently returned from a trip to the Pacific Coast in company with Mr. Wm. Findlay, also a member of the Executive Committee. During this trip every province in the West was interviewed in the interests of the work of the Association and consultations were held with the Highway Departments of the various provinces and officials of the cities and good roads and automobile associations.

The invitation, extended by the Government of the Province of Alberta, to hold the Convention in that province was unanimously supported by the City Council of Edmonton and by the Edmonton Enthusiasm for the Convention and the work of the Canadian Good Roads Association was shown in every city visited. Each Provincial Government in the West will be represented at the Convention by its Highway Officials, as well as by its Highway Officials. There will be many delegates who are interested in the Automobile Clubs and Good Roads Association, as well as a large number who see in the building of highways on the Prairies and at the Coast, one of the most important economic steps in the development of that country.

Since the return of Messrs. Squire and Findlay to Toronto, assurances have been received of an important and numerous attendance from the East.
