SMELTS.—Large shipments of smelts are now leaving the Island by express every day for the American market. On Saturday morning 116 boxes from King's County, were expressed to New York.

SWANSEA TRADER.—The S. S. Swansea Trader, of the Furness Line, arrived in Charlottetown Friday morning with a good inward cargo. She left on return to Halifax calling at shore points, with an extra-large general cargo.

SERIOUS SITUATION.—The cargo of coal which the schooner Florence carried when she landed at Rustico Harbour was all taken away in a couple of days. As this is probably her last trip on account of the fall weather, the people of Rustico are at a loss as to what they are going to do for their winter fuel. INSTITUTE WORK.—The women's Institute of Clyde deserve credit for their efforts towards the improvement of the school. With the aid of the funds raised in the various ways by the ladies the trustees have been able to accomplish a marked change in the interior of the school. A new hearthboard ceiling, walls suitably papered, woodwork painted in corresponding shades, new blinds, and a new black board, all go to make one of the most attractive, bright and clean schools in Queen's County, and one of which the district may be justly proud. The institute still continues its meetings, when discussions on various household topics are held. On Wednesday the talk on Hints for saving time and energy in housework, was found very interesting. This society is planning to continue the good work of improvement already begun in the district.

THE NORTHUMBERLAND.—The Picton boat, the S. S. Northumberland, got back to Charlottetown from her daily trip across to the Mainland at an early hour on Saturday, docking at 4.30 p. m.

CHIMNEY BLAZE.—About twenty minutes after five o'clock on Saturday evening an alarm of fire was raised, and the Fire Brigade, with commendable promptitude, responded to the call for its services. The outbreak was reported to be at the residence, at the corner of Fitzroy and Hillsborough streets, of Mr. C. H. B. Leavelle. It appeared that a blaze had started in one of the chimneys and this was put out before any damage was done.

BRIDGE WORK ARRIVES.—The tug Amherst returned to Charlottetown from Picton on Saturday with a quantity of steelwork for bridge building for the Government. This consisted of the super-structures of a fifty-foot span bridge and two thirty-five-foot span bridges. The fifty-foot span is for the new bridge to be erected at Turner's Mill Vale; replacing the structure that was recently swept away from there in a freshet. With respect to the other two bridges, one is to be placed at Creamer's, near Crapaud, and the other on the Centre Line road at a point near Plusville.

THE LOCAL MARKET.—There is very little chance to report in the local markets during the past week. The roads were somewhat bad and retarded farmers from bringing in their produce. Quite a lot of pork, however, has been moving and the price has become easier by one-quarter per cent. per lb. This is a sympathy with the Toronto market, which is also reported to be easier. Local buyers and shippers of the product report that they are unable to make any margin of profit in competition with packers on the spot. The potato market is rather quiet; shipments being pretty well suspended on account of the danger of destruction from frost. The butter market remains about the same as last week. The supply of eggs is yet very short and seemingly getting shorter; prices ranging from 30 to 35 cents per dozen. This is quite as high as the egg market has ever got before. Though eggs are scarce, there is plenty of poultry offering, most of which is finding its way to the canning factory. There is an excellent market in the Canadian West for canned chicken; and following a shipment of a carload of this class of goods being due to the fall during the Fall, another carload, it is understood, is being prepared for despatch to the same destination.

SCHOOL INSPECTION.—St. Andrew's School of North Rustico, which, less than a year ago was raised to the rank of first class schools and which is under the care of Mr. Denis D. Arsenault, Principal; Mr. John Gauthier, vice principal; and Miss Gertrude Pineau, assistant, received the visit of Mr. R. H. Campbell, chief superintendent of education for the province. Mr. Campbell has found the school in a fairly good condition for a newly graded first class school. After examination of each subject he gave proof of his satisfaction. He stated that History especially, was remarkably satisfactory. After having looked in the classes of the different departments the far-seeing superintendent stated that considerable progress had been made since his last visit in January last. He also remarks that with a good attendance, and with the same teachers for another year, the classes would certainly attain a high standard which would be a credit not only to Rustico but to the whole province, with Mr. Campbell as superintendent. In leaving, he promised to do all in his power to pay another visit in the spring. It would be ungrateful not to be thankful to Mr. Campbell for his services, consequently the teachers, trustees, rate-payers in general, join in offering him their most hearty thanks.—R.

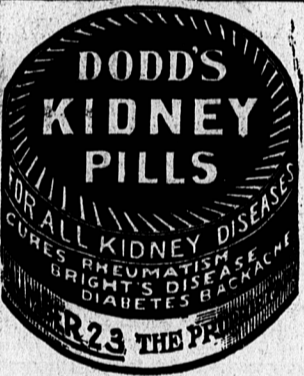
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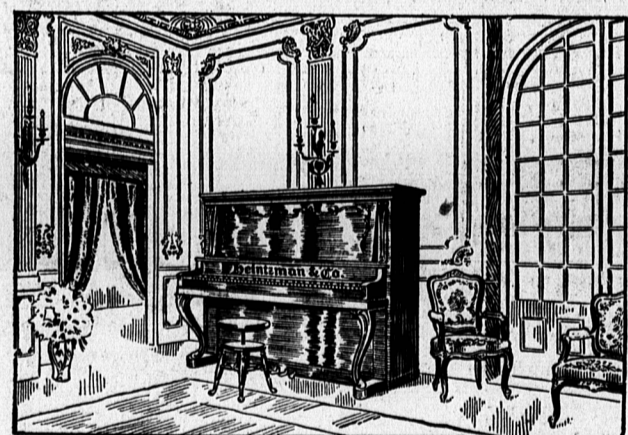


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
