WILL THE COMMISSION MEET AGAIN?

There is considerable interest on both sides of the boundary line as to whether the International High Commission will resume its sittings, and if so what will be the date of its meeting. It will be remembered that various matters of difference relating to the Atlantic and Pacific fisheries, the bonding privilege, the Alaskan boundary and other questions had long been pending between the United States and Canada, and that in 1888 a Joint High Commission was appointed by the Governments of London and Washington for their settlement Lord Herschell, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir Louis Davis, and Mr. John Charlton were appointed to represent Britain and Canada and Hon. Messrs. C. W. Fairbanks, George Grey, John W. Foster, Nelson Dingley, John A. Kasson and T. J. Coolidge to present the United States.

The High Commission met in Quebec, August 23rd 1898, when Lord Herschell was appointed chairman. The meeting was continued till 22d September when an adjournment was made. Resuming on September 20th it continued till 10th October. The place of meeting was then changed to Washington where the sitting continued from 5th January 1899 to 20th February following. Then an adjournment was made till August following. In the meantime some important changes were made in the personnel of the Commission. Mr. Grey received another appointment as Peace Commissioner at Paris and Mr. Faulkner was appointed in his stead. Mr. Dingley died on 13th January, 1899 and Hon. L. E. Payne was named to succeed him. Lord Herschell died in Washington on 1st March.

The work of the Commission was left entirely incomplete when it last adjourned although a basis of agreement had been reached on all other questions save that of the Alaskan boundary. That question was so vital and pressing that the Canadian representatives thought it best to leave open all the other questions until this most urgent one is determined, believing that this course reserved a better vantage ground for Canada than if a part were settled while the boundary matter remained open. Subsequently a temporary boundary was agreed upon between the Washington and London Governments, which defines the respective limits of national jurisdiction in the disputed territory, without prejudice until a permanent boundary is agreed upon.

Thus the matter stands at present. In the meantime a Presidential election in the United States and a general federal election in the Dominion have sustained the two Governments of the United States and Canada, so that the same authorities on both sides of the line are left free to resume the unfinished and important negotiations. Senator Fairbanks has given out the statement that a number of letters have passed between him and Sir Wilfrid Laurier from time to time since the Commission last sat, and there appears to be a general desire on both sides that the work shall be completed, but no date has yet been set for a resumption of

the Commission's sittings. On the American side the present obstacle to the immediate resumption of the negotiations is that the leading members of both parties in Congress will be greatly occupied with important matters of legislation during the coming short session.

It seems tolerably certain that the negotiations will be resumed and it is to be earnestly hoped that a fair and final settlement may be reached in regard to the matters at issue. It is important to both countries, and to Prince Edward Island it is of the greater interest because of the active and prominent part taken in the proceedings by Sir Louis Davies, our representative in the Cabinet and on the Commission. We are glad to find that he has given an authoritative denial to the report of his intended withdrawal from political life. It is doubly important that the Canadian statesmen who have been conversant with the proceedings of the Commission from the outset, who are seized of the information bearing upon the matters in dispute and who know the difficulties and the men they are to meet, should continue in the work until it is completed.
