New Type X Ray Tube Announced

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Dec. 26.—A new type of X-ray tube, which like a magic lantern shows the inner doings of an atom magnified 200-million times, was announced today at Purdue University.

The tube is set up like a "lantern" and its invisible rays are focussed upon a photographic film nine feet away. Much as a showman would insert a slide in his lantern, the scientists insert a piece of "excited" copper, that is, copper the atoms of which are activated by treatment with some form of energy.

Upon the photographic film, after a minute's exposure, there forms an image quite like a picket fence, with numerous pickets missing. These pickets are the "spectral lines," each of which depicts something going on inside an atom.

Two of these lines are particularly remarkable. They are as far apart as the width of the head of a pin. But this space between them represents the distance an electron has "moved over" within the copper atom, a distance estimated at a 200-millionth part of an inch. The move is made when the electron changes from one "orbit" to another, and each of its orbits shows as a line.

The tube is exceedingly "fast." It will X-ray clearly the atomic "bones" of solidified vapor, which hitherto has evaporated too rapidly to be caught in this manner in the open air. Formerly such pictures had to be made of vapors in a vacuum.

The tube is useful also for taking X-rays of numerous organic substances which disintegrate rapidly. Dr. Lark-Horowitz said the construction is so simple that "any mechanic can make one of these tubes."

COUNTY COURT

The December Term of the County Court of Prince County commenced on Friday at Summerside, His Honour Judge Inman presiding. In the case of Jessie M. Bowen versus Lloyd Daley, action for debt commenced by capias trial last term. Judgment was given. The defendant was not a resident and was home on a visit. The Judge held that he was not leaving the Province to evade the payment of his debts and set the capias aside and discharged the bondsmen, but let the capias stand as a summons and on the merits gave judgment for the Plaintiff for \$50.00. In the case of R. T. Holman Limited vs. Willis R. Warren. Action for price of a gasoline engine for \$125.00 tried August term. The Judge gave judgment for the Plaintiff for \$75.00, allowing the defendant a reduction of \$50 on the amount claimed, as the engine was proved not to have worked satisfactorily. There were 28 cases on the regular docket for trial. The debt cases which were contested, were disposed of during the day and the Court adjourned at 5 o'clock until January 4th, 1933, when the first of the cases which are set down for trial on days to suit the litigants will be heard. The Court will be in session the greater part of January hearing the contested cases.—S.

Creosoted Wood-Pipe

For centuries wooden pipes have been used for supplying water for domestic purposes. Originally holes were bored through logs and this method was satisfactory where pipe with a small diameter was required. The next development was the wood stave pipe with the staves held in position by wire or by steel hoops, and this type has been used for diameters ranging from six inches to six feet and over. Under certain conditions the wooden staves decayed and this was overcome by treating the staves with creosote. A low initial cost, together with long life, results in a very moderate annual charge for wood stave pipe and it is frequently used for town and city water supplies. When the water is chlorinated an objectionable taste develops and the Forest Products Laboratories of the Forest Service, Department of the Interior, have been investigating methods for removing the taste. Experiments carried out indicate that the taste can be removed by filtering the water through activated carbon. Activated carbon, which is more absorbent than ordinary carbon or charcoal developed during the war for gas masks.
