THE CHINESE BADLY DEFEATED.

PEKIN, April 27.—Three engagements occurred on the 23rd and 24th of April, at the great wall, between four columns under Gen. Kelleter and the Chinese troops under General Liu.

The Chinese were everywhere defeated and after stubborn resistance were forced back over the wall, being pursued as far as Ku Kuan.

Our casualties were four officers wounded, three men killed and thirty-two wounded. The French troops were not engaged.

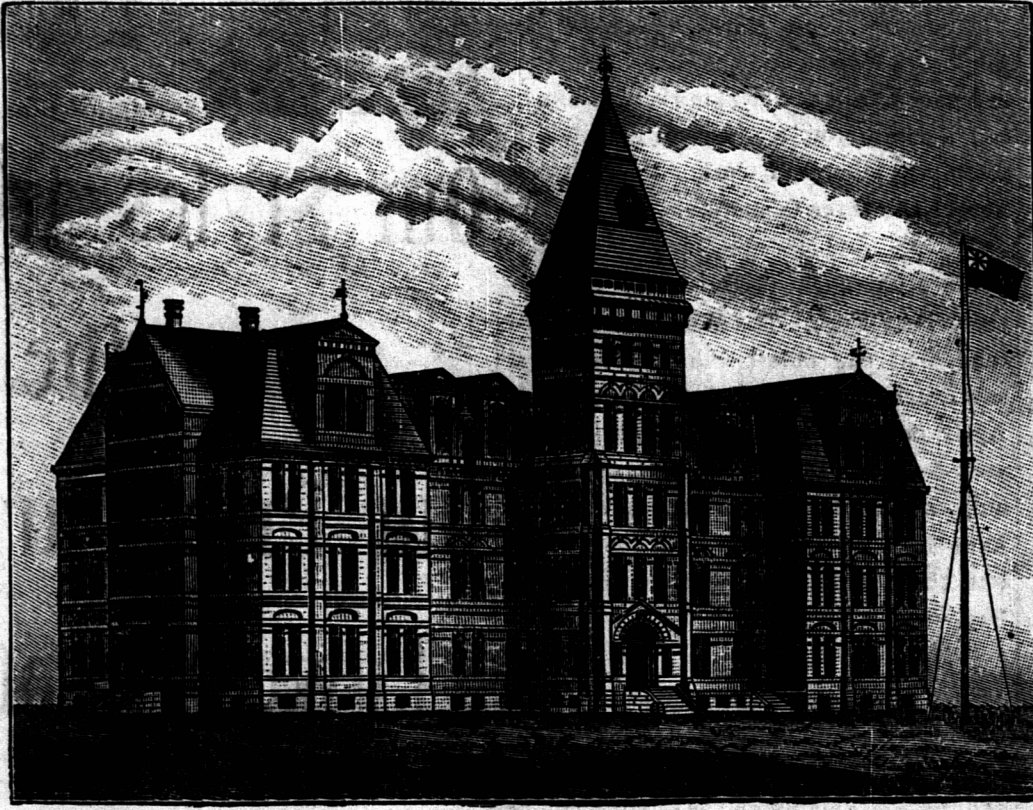

DEAD IN KITCHEN

Was it From Natural Causes or Foul Play?

BODY TO BE EXHUMED

And an Inquest to be Held To-day is the latest Despatch of Last Night.

A sensational report reached the city yesterday afternoon stating that an old lady of Rose Valley about two miles from Braclabane had died from the result of foul play.

Upon a query THE GUARDIAN learns that the following story was in circulation last night in the districts surrounding where the deceased lived:

An old lady named Mrs. McLeod, widow of Donald McLeod, aged about seventy years, living with her son, Archibald McLeod, died under peculiar circumstances a few days ago. It appears that Mr. McLeod and family retired on the night in question and left the old lady sitting up as it was usual for her to do. Wishing to visit his stock about midnight, Mr. McLeod set the clock to alarm at 12. He arose and went down to the kitchen where he found his mother lying dead on the floor. He immediately notified his brother and some neighbors. Mrs. McLeod was buried at Springton a day or two after death.

Since the funeral various reports have been circulated. It is alleged that there were marks on the woman's face and that she was bleeding from the mouth and nose.

It is also alleged that Chas. McDonald, school teacher, Malcolm McKenzie and a young lady at J. J. Bethune's heard screaming between nine and ten o'clock.

A telephone message last night states the body would be exhumed and an inquest held this morning.

It is also stated that deceased was subject to fits and died from the effects of one of her usual attacks.

The deceased woman's husband was drowned in a well some five or six years ago.

BOERS BADLY BEATEN

Many Prisoners Taken—Futile Attempt to Catch Cecil Rhodes.

THREE CANADIAN TROOPERS DEAD.

OTTAWA, April 29.—(Special).—Letters from the South Africa Constabulary mailed at Cape Verde announce the death on the passage of three soldiers, Staff Sergt. Englishman, Trooper Patton, St. John and Trooper Mann of Ottawa.

BOERS CAPTURED BY GREENFALL.

LONDON, April 29.—(Special).—Lord Kitchener reports that the scouts under Grenfell captured Van Rensburg's laager at Klip Dam.

Several Boers were killed 37 captured, also ammunition, waggons, horses, etc. SUCCESS OF OTHER COLUMNS.

Other British columns report the killing of three Boers, capturing 58 and 57 surrendering. Also one quick firing gun was taken.

ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE CECIL RHODES.

On April 27 the Boers blew up the railway between Gaspan and Belmont, apparently to intercept the train bearing Cecil Rhodes.
