LORD SALISBURY'S SPEECH.

The speech delivered on the 9th instant before the Primrose League was quite hopeful as regards the progress and prospects of the war in South Africa, but sufficiently grave in describing the general outlook. He recognised the fact that a considerable portion of the subjects of foreign powers, whose Governments preserve friendly relations with Britain are bitterly hostile to our common country and emphasised the necessity of defensive measures. On this point he said:

"That root of bitterness against England, which I am unable to explain, may be mere caprice to satisfy the exigencies of journalists to-day or it may indicate a deep seated feeling which later, we may have to reckon with. There can be no security nor confidence in the feelings of sympathy of other nations except through the efficiency of their own defence and the strength of our own right arm. Everywhere the power of defence is increasing, and who knows but all these things may be united in one great wave to dash upon our shores?"

We all know very well that the "root of bitterness" against Britain has sprung up in many lands and shows no present indication of dying out. But Lord Salisbury, who as Foreign Minister, must be possessed of information more full and complete than is available to Parliament or the press, would hardly have used such grave words as those we have just quoted without some adequate reason. In what followed he emphasised the great importance of giving greater attention to the land defences of the British Islands, and hinted that there might be an existing over confidence in the ability of the navy to repel all attacks:

"In every race in history the great maritime power has been paralyzed, killed, not by disaster suffered in its provinces, but by a blow directed at the heart. The British navy, of course, ought to be sufficient. But are we wise in placing all our eggs in the basket?"

The passages quoted indicate a vague fear of a Continental combination, which might possibly succeed in affecting a landing on the shores of the British Isles. It was not a little singular that in the same address Lord Salisbury should have brought in a reference to Home Rule in Ireland as a measure that could not safely be granted. Neither the statement itself nor the unvarnished terms in which it was made are calculated to soothe the feelings of the disaffected portion of the Irish people. We are not surprised to find some English journals commenting upon this portion of the speech as calculated to undo in large measure the good effect of Her Majesty's recent visit.

There must be some grave reason for the remarkable speech which Lord Salisbury made and hence there is a strong feeling that there is something of serious import developing behind the scenes which only the future can fully reveal.

The Hansard report of Mr. J. H. Bell's speech in the Commons on Mr. Flint's Provincial Prohibition resolutions shows it to have been an admirable effort. If space would permit, which it will not at present, we would gladly reprint Mr. Bell's speech, as its views are quite closely in accord with those expressed from time to time in these columns.

Referring to the statement of Mr. McWilliams made in the Legislature that Mr. Wise at the time of his ejection from the House was under the influence of liquor, THE GUARDIAN is informed by Mr. Wise and others whose statements we accept, that the charge is untrue. We publish many sayings of members without commenting on what they say, but it seems unfair to Mr. Wise that the statement referred to in this case should go forth uncontradicted.
