HEAVY SNOWFALL.—The central part of the Island was visited by a heavy fall of snow on Wednesday last. Consequently it was not such a green Xmas as the people anticipated.—S.

FOREST HILL.—The half-year examination of Forest Hill School, was held on Tuesday, December 23rd at 9.30 a. m. The goodly number of visitors and school officers present, showed the deep interest the people of that district take in school work. The pupils were carefully examined by their teacher Miss Hannah Sinnott, assisted by the former teacher, Miss Hattie McSwain, and acquitted themselves creditably. Complimentary remarks were made by several. The teacher treated both visitors and pupils to some delicious home made candy, and the school, was dismissed for the Christmas holidays. SPEED CONTESTS.—Great George Street was the centre of attraction on Christmas Day, the sidewalks being lined with interested spectators who watched the numerous speed contests which took place from the Fountain to the Colonial Building Square. Hundreds of contestants made the scene lively and exhilarating. Some of the city's best horses, including Cherry Ripe 2.21, Iona Girl 2.19, Dominion D. 2.20, Iona Boy 2.25, and others gave some splendid exhibitions of speed. Christmas and New Year's Days are considered "off" days in regard to speed regulations so far as Great George Street is concerned. This street, from time immemorial, has been the scene of speedway contests on these holidays. It is hoped that on New Year's Day there will sufficient snow for sleighing.

BIBLE SOCIETY.—The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Branch of the Canadian Bible Society will be held during the week of Prayer, Thursday evening Jan 8th, in the First Methodist Church, Charlottetown. Already over \$900 has been sent in from the collectors and different branches in the province. In order that full reports may be given at the annual meeting all collectors and branches should send in their reports not later than January 5. Some \$1100 was collected last year for the Bible Society in this province. During the past summer over 700 Bibles were sold west of Bloomfield in Prince County and several homes that were unable to purchase were each given one free. While the British and Foreign Bible Society is known to be doing a great work throughout the world it is interesting to know that even in Prince Edward Island with its admittedly small needs there is much being done that is needed.

Lafferty asked the Court's clemency on account of his wife and small family, but was fined \$50, with the option of three months' imprisonment. It is the intention to prosecute another of Walker's assailants, but he has succeeded up to the present in evading the service of the summonses.

EXAMINATIONS.—The semi-annual examination of Mount Hope School was held on Tuesday, December 23rd, at one o'clock, in the presence of a number of visitors. The pupils were examined in the various subjects by their teacher, Miss Amy H. Toombs, assisted by Miss Florence McSwain, and their prompt and correct answers testified of careful instruction. Well-rendered recitations and a humorous reading, were much enjoyed by all. Several expressed their satisfaction in the progress of the school, and their appreciation of Miss Toombs' painstaking efforts. Each pupil received a suitable Christmas remembrance, and all were treated to a generous supply of confectionery. The examination, which was a decided success and a credit, to both teacher and pupils, was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem.

MT. STEWART SCHOOL.—The semi-annual examination of the Mt. Stewart School was held on Monday afternoon the 22nd. Both departments were tastefully decorated with mottoes and green festooning and the Christmas spirit was quite evident in the happy countenance of the children. Sixteen parents and visitors were present and the principal, Mr. Green and his assistant, Miss Walsh were aided in the examination by Mr. Isaac Jay, a former teacher, who has 37 years means lost his interest in education.
