RUSTICO AND CHARLOTTETOWN MAP SHEETS

The Geographic Section of the Department of National Defence has recently published the Rustico and Charlottetown sheets of the National Topographic series. These maps, which are on a scale of one mile to an inch, cover the central portion of the Province of Prince Edward Island, and were prepared from surveys and aerial photographs. The maps show railways, highways, local roads, water areas, wooded areas, villages, post offices, telephone and telegraph offices, farm houses, churches, schools, etc., as well as contours at 25-foot intervals. Copies of these sheets may be obtained from the Geographic and Map Service, Labelle Building, Ottawa, at twenty-five cents per copy. One copy will be furnished free to any school situated within the area upon application of the principal.

BOSTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Discovery of a Nazi Swastika and a Communist hammer and sickle chalked on the door of a grain elevator containing 1,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat awaiting shipment to Great Britain caused police today to increase precautionary measures along the waterfront.
