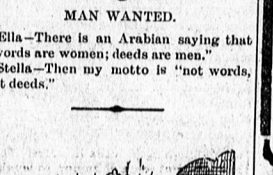
SWIMMERS MAKE NEW RECORDS

NEW YORK, March 1.—Expert amateur swimmers took part in the initial session of the A. A. U.'s indoor swimming and water polo championships, which took place in the Natatorium of the New York A. C. tonight. One world's record and several American records were smashed. The honors of the night went to C. M. Daniels, of the New York A. C., who lowered the world's record of 32 1-5 sec. for 100 yds. in-door, held by Cecil Healy, of Australia. Daniels covered the distance in 31 1-5 secs., doing it in an extra spurt, after having won the 50 yds. swim in 25 2-5, a new American record.

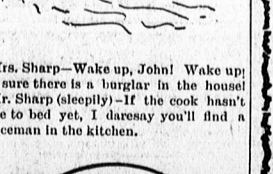
Incidentally during the contest, which was decided in heats, Daniels established new figures for intermediate distances as follows: 25 yds.—12 secs., and 40 yds.—19 3-5 secs. E. H. Adams of the New York A. C. equalled his own American record of 60 ft. for the plunging championship.
