## Abbies Lose Close Battle To Halifax

### First And Third Period Goals Give Wolves Victory

Sargent, Abbie Goalie Gives Sensational Display In Final Session. Ferguson & Mosher Goal-getters.

HALIFAX, Jan. 25.—Scoring goals in the first and last periods, Halifax Wolverines took things easy tonight defeating Charlottetown Abegweits 2-0 in the first game of a three out of five series for the Maritime Hockey League's championship.

Vince Ferguson grabbed up the first marker late in the opening period when he received a pass from Frankie Graham with all Wolves up-ice on a gang play. In the dying minutes of the game, Ernie Mosher, tricky centre artist, picked up a loose puck and scored an easy goal.

Both teams played defensive hockey through two slow, uninteresting periods and waited for the best individually, speed artists kept boring down the ice first from one end then the other, but seldom got far against an opposing five man defense.

The last period, however, was a different story and in producing the best hockey of the night, gave an exhibition of rugged, hard-hitting, fast-breaking play. Two fights and eight penalties livened things up.

Through that last period, Leo Sargent in the Abbies' goal, had one of the best games of his long career in Maritime hockey on several occasions, he turned away rubber from just about every point on the compass. In the last period he handled 20 shots.

Frankie Lavigne, stocky little Halifax defenseman, renowned as the league's badman, was in fine form. He had two short but snappy fights in the last period, one with Whitlock, snappy little Abbie winger, and one with Frankie Currie, who had a chip on his shoulder all night.

In the first period, Jackie Kane and Reggie Shields had open nets looking for them, but somehow the puck just wouldn't go in, Shields' hitting the post.

With McKie and Nicholson of the Abbies both off together, however, the Wolves got the chance they were looking for and began their first really dangerous attack of the night. Overtime Session Fails To Break Deadlock At St. John.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 25.—Overtime battle failed to break a 1-1 deadlock between Saint John Beavers and Moncton Hawks in a New Brunswick Mercantile League hockey fixture here tonight.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Jan. 25.—On a recount after a hurried meeting of the New York State Athletic Commission tonight, midgetweight champion, Vince Dundee was awarded a 10-round decision tonight over Eddie "Babe" Risko, of Syracuse, N. Y., newest sensation among the 100-pounders.

For 10 minutes after Risko first was seen the decision on what was announced as a divided verdict of Referee Jed Cahah and judges Jack Britton and S. Sney Scharlin, the crowd of 8,221 howled so loudly in protest that the commission chairman, General John J. Phelan, quickly gathered the ballots for a recount.

The mixup in the decision saved the evening for everyone but Risko, who came into the Garden heralded as a new Stanley Ketchel by reason of his knocking out champion Teddy Yarusso New Year's Day in Scranton, Pa., in a non-title match.

There was little excitement in the arena until the weird mental gymnastics of the arbiters turned up a trifle of chaos.

In his customary shuffling fashion, the sad-eyed Dundee went about his workmanlike job of unmaking the 22-year-old sailor phenomenon who has everything as far as physical makeup is concerned, that a fighter could need.

The Abegweits—by Lt. Col. A. E. Ings, V.D.

Only a very few of our oldest citizens are acquainted with the early history of this well known Football Team.

In the autumn of 1894 George E. and D. H. Robinson, K. J. Martin, I. H. McNeill, A. E. Ings, W. A. Weeks, (Major), D. J. McDonald, Charles Kennedy and Aeneas A. McCharles met and organized a football club one afternoon. A. E. Ings shortly before had read in one of our local papers the short poem "Abegweits" written many years before by a former Rector of Post Hill D. Johnson, Chairman of the Amherst Amateur Athletic Association hockey committee.

The following were the first officials:—W. A. Weeks, President; New Glasgow, N.S., Dalhousie and Wanderers of Halifax, and on one occasion the Duke of Wellington's Royal West Kent Regiment.

The uniform of the early days was, dark blue jersey and stockings, white shorts, on left breast of jersey a shield with the Island arms worked in red silk.

Some few years later was the era of such well known athletes as the MacKinnon (L. C. and J. A.), D. A. MacMillan (L. C. and J. W. Jones), R. A. Donahoe and J. Parker Hooper, to mention only a few.

These with others established and maintained the high reputation of the Abegweits on the football field and in track and field sports. But Hubert McDonald, C. Leigh (L. and Col.) and many others whose names that will make another story.

Robinson who was one of the great football players this province ever produced and who now resides in Vancouver, B.C., and the following came back: "I have been in the 1884-1891 team of the Abegweits of Montreal in their game with the Abbies Christmas week, is considered the best defence man in the Ottawa-Montreal League. He is playing with what was considered a rather mediocre team, La Pointe, but due to his goal getting ability they have been going places and look for a berth in the playoffs. He crashed through the Ottawa defence which came to be adopted, and by the old sportsman who can still recollect the prowess displayed by the athletes mentioned."

Major H. L. Bethune, V.D., of the Hughes Drug Company, is just recovering from a very serious attack of bronchial pneumonia. It is the first time that Ham (Bethune) has been ill in the writer's recollection and it has always taken the best of care of himself and his good habits probably pulled him through this time.

O., became an officer, going to France in 1915 with the Second Heavy Battery and having them.
