The reports of the Grand Officers, the Grand Chief Templar, the Grand Secretary, the Grand Supt. of Juvenile Templars and Grand Treasurer were read. The report showed that although the I. O. G. T. in P. E. I. is not as strong as we would like, yet it is encouraging to hear that several of the older lodges have made during the year just ended most remarkable progress. 12 lodges are in good standing, with a membership of 307. The financial statement shows a balance in favor of the Grand Lodge of \$25.57.

Five Juvenile Temples are in good standing with a membership of 116. Short reports were received from the representatives of the lodges all reporting in a healthy and growing condition, not only in membership but in strength of influence. The Grand Lodge adjourned to meet at two o'clock in the afternoon.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
The afternoon session was largely taken up by receiving and discussing the reports of the standing committees. It was recommended that the Grand Lodge make a grand effort to revive the order throughout the Province and also that we petition the Supreme Lodge for its help. The Grand Chief Templar, S. M. Martin, and the Grand Secretary, A. D. Fraser were appointed a committee to extend the greetings and an address of welcome to the National Division of the Sons of Temperance meeting at Charlottetown, July 10th 1901.

That since the Government have appointed a prosecutor for East Kings, without the approval and consent of the temperance people, therefore Resolved that this Grand Lodge petition the Government to cancel the said appointment and place the whole county under the jurisdiction of prosecutor Beers.

The thanks of the Grand Lodge were extended to the people of Dundas for their kindness and hospitality, also to the trustees of the Baptist Church for allowing the Grand Lodge the use of their building. The Grand Lodge then closed to meet again in Roseneath next summer 1902. A public meeting was held in the evening presided over by the Grand Chief Templar. The program consisted of music singing, speeches and recitations.
