"The treatment of the prisoner and his crime," declared Mr. Archibald, "suffers more from a general ignorance and apathy than from any public opposition. One of the best agencies operated by the Dominion is the parole system," said Mr. Archibald. It will be remembered that Mr. Archibald delivered several addresses in Charlottetown last summer, on the subjects of Crime and Criminals.

Test for Astigmatism
